



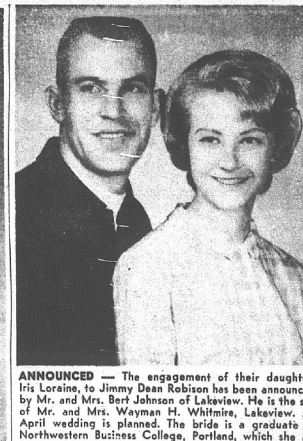

The occasional night out may be a great treat for most women of young children. Often though, it can prove exhausting. Just the thought of how to dress and what to do with your hair creates a tizzy of a problem.

Here are some tips to ease you into a relaxing evening looking well - groomed: If you do your own hair, have it sparkling clean. For long hair, try back-combing the crown and pin this in place with a gray satin bow. Select a shade that gives dramatic contrast to your dress. Slightly more formal is a jeweled velvet bandeau which you can get inexpensively in a five - and - dime or department store. Simply comb your hair straight back from the forehead and sides and slip on the bandeau. Usually a necklace or large jeweled pin will be all the jewelry you need with such a bright headpiece.

Another refreshing change for your hairdo is to tuck a bright red carnation, without foliage or fern, into your hair on one side. Brush your hair whether it is short or long to one side of the head and place the flower of your choice in your hair where it looks best for you. Further entertainment was provided by Theresa Mason, freshman at Klamath Union High School. Her puppet show used original dialogue and puppets which she makes.

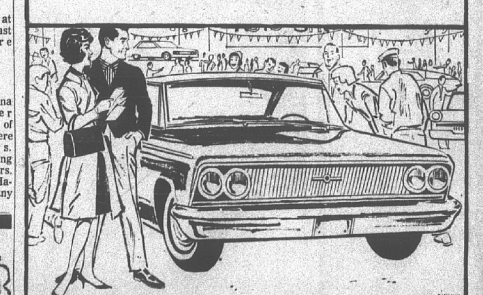
