

# Brazilian Youth Tells Impressions Of U.S.

Popular Roberto "Bob" Moura, foreign exchange student from Brazil, told of his native country and gave some of his impressions of the United States during a speech at Rotary Club Friday.

His appearance before the Rotarians is one of the first he has made here, it being a rule of the American Field Service program that a student must have been in school for a certain period before expressing opinions on his new experiences.

Moura told how he enjoys living with the Adolph Zamsky family, his "adopted" parents in Klamath Falls. In introducing his "charge" Zamsky indicated the feeling is mutual.

The handsome, dark-haired Roberto described Brazil's geography, outlined some of its political ups and downs, its religious structure and language spoken.

**Brazil Republic**

He noted Brazil is a Republic, experienced a revolution during the past year but is progressing well under a new president. World War II hero Gen. Humberto Castelo Branco, who moved into office last April 11, Young Moura reminded Rotarians that Brazil was the fourth largest nation in the world from the standpoint of land area; eighth in population, 95 per cent of which is Catholic. Brazil, explained Roberto, is the new capital of Brazil. It is a beautiful, modern city as slides he showed testified, and it is located in virtually the center of the country. It be-

Up again at 7 a.m. Didn't allow much time for horseplay up and down the main stem. But today we're living in another era. C'est la guerre!

Sharing the same platform the other day with Roberto, was an A-1 young man name of Bill Mesley, who is prexy of the OTT student body. He is spearheading a campaign for a new student memorial chapel on the campus. It would be used for Owl undergrads, faculty members, parents and the folks downtown. It isn't much of a college or university that doesn't have a chapel to help remind the young person the biggest 864 question of them all is "Who am I? What am I doing here? And where am I going?"

## Alturas School Units To Vote On Unification

A majority vote will determine the proposition's passing with two parts on the ballot to be voted on. The first part calls for a vote on unification, the second asks that all bonded indebtedness of the district be levied, requiring a two-thirds majority vote to pass.

Present bonded indebtedness exists at South Fork Elementary of \$49,000 by July 15, 1965, and at Alturas Elementary of \$25,000 by December, 1973.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the seven elementary schools within the proposed district.

## KUHS Club Sells Candy For Journey

# Southern Cafe Owner Bows To Integration

ATLANTA (UPI) — Lester Maddox, one of the South's most fiery segregationists, bowed to the federal courts Saturday after months of litigation and announced he would admit Negroes to his cafeteria. The announcement was greeted with tears by some of the building restaurant owners supporters.

"I have no choice," said Maddox, who was found in contempt of court Friday by federal Judge Frank A. Hooper. Hooper warned Maddox he would be fined \$200 for every day he continued to disobey court orders to integrate his eating establishment.

Maddox made his statement after an hour-long private conference with his three attorneys, during which he was at one point pounding the table.

Although Maddox told the crowd that "I must abide by the court order," he vowed again to continue his battle against the 1964 civil rights bill.

"We are not surrendering, but only accepting that which is being forced upon us that we feel violates our oath to God," Maddox said. "We shall continue this fight as long as we live."

As Maddox made his statement in the glare of television lights, approximately 100 white patrons were having lunch at his cafeteria, which is located close to the Georgia Tech campus. In the opening hours of business Saturday, no Negroes attempted to gain admittance.

The contempt charge was raised against Maddox by four Negroes who were denied service at the restaurant. Judge Hooper made his ruling after a non-jury trial earlier last week, and during the trial Maddox

said he would appeal the decision if it went against him.

**Quotes Bible**

"Maddox made his announcement Saturday in a long statement, beginning in his usual fashion by quoting from the Bible, and then expressed his sorrow that the civil rights bill ever had become law.

Maddox told the crowd, "I'm going to keep fighting, but I can't disobey the law."

"To disobey the federal court order would put me in the same category as those Communist-inspired agitators who break the law all the time," he said. "One man can't carry the whole United States on his back."

"This is the worst thing ever to hit me," he said. "If I had just one business man in every 100 to stand up with me in this fight, I could have won it."
