Bitter Steel Union Campaign Closes With Final Vote Bids

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — One of the most bitter campaigns in the history of American trade unions comes to a close tonight when the candidates for president of the United Steelworkers Union (USW) make an 11th hour bid for votes.

Incumbent David J. McDonald, seeking his fourth term as president of the nation's third largest union, woos voters in Buffalo, N. Y., and Ontario, Canada.

USW Secretary - Treasurer I. W. Abel, competing for the \$50,000-a-year post, will make his pitch in Canton, Ohio, where he began his ascent to the union hierarchy 22 years ago as director of USW District 27.

Tuesday is election day. Voting will continue throughout the day at 3,300 union halls in the U. S. and Canada.

Approximately 976,000 members will be eligible to vote for the man they want to lead the union for the next four years.

McDonald was challenged four years ago by Donald C. Rarick, a rank-and-file stockworker who ran on the dues protest ticket. McDonald won 404,172 votes to Rarick's 104,000.

Howard Hague, seeking reelection as vice president, and Al Whitehouse, Cincinnati district director aspiring to be secretary - treasurer, are on the McDonald ticket.

Abel's running mates are Joseph P. Molony, Buffalo district director, and Walter R. Burke, Milwaukee district director, for vice president and secretary-treasurer respectively.

In addition, six of the USW's 30 districts have put up candidates for directors.

Sen. Russell In Hospital

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., who underwent emergency throat surgery at Walter Reed Army Hospital, was reported in satisfactory condition today.

Surgeons performed a tracheotomy Sunday for treatment of bronchitis.

The tracheotomy, a windpipe incision, was performed to ease Russell's breathing, his doctors said.

The veteran lawmaker's bronchial attack was complicated by emphysema, a lung condition from which he has suffered for several years, a spokesman said.

Doctors decided throat surgery was necessary to bring a more direct supply of air to his lungs.

Negro Leaders Call For More Selma Demonstrations

Negro leaders in Selma, Ala., early today rejected a concession by voter registration officials and called for more demonstrations in a drive that has already resulted in the arrest of more than 3,300.

The voter registration drive entered the fourth week since it was kicked off by Dr. Martin Luther King, who called Selma and the soil rich rural areas adjoining it one of the most segregated areas in the nation.

The concession, offered on an unofficial basis, would have allowed Negro voter applicants to go through tentative registration processes on extra days.

The Rev. James Bevel called the proposed arrangement "a court order to serve Negroes."
