# Crash Claims 84 On Plane

NEW YORK (UPI) — An engine plane erupted into a mass of flames at 6:37 p.m. EST Monday about three miles off the shore and only minutes after taking off from Kennedy International Airport. Most of those who saw the plane fall agreed that a violent explosion came with the crash.

None of the crew members or passengers aboard the plane were rescued today. The wreckage of the plane, a Boeing 707, was seen by a search plane from the U.S. Navy. The plane was carrying 84 people, including 79 passengers and five crew members. The plane was en route from New York to London. The crash site is located in the Atlantic Ocean, about three miles off the coast of New York.

Search Hugs Area  
The blast ripped the plane apart, sending it into a ball of fire. The wreckage was seen by a search plane from the U.S. Navy. ## Utah Firm Buys Site From City

A Utah lumberman announced Tuesday that he will move his lumber remanufacturing plant to Klamath Falls from Kanab, Utah, this year.

Merrill R. Dame said he will build a new plant on an 18-acre site he purchased from the city. When completed, Dame said, the new plant will employ more than 30 men with an annual payroll of \$160,000.

The site of the new plant is on Lake Ewans, adjacent to the Pacific Power and Light service center. Dame purchased the site last week from the city and outlined details to newsmen, but the plans were not announced until Tuesday—after the council had formally ratified the sale.

Construction Ready  
Dame said construction on the new plant will begin "as soon as the weather allows." Terms of the agreement with the city call for construction to begin by July 1 and completion within one year from that date. If these terms are not fulfilled, the site will revert to city ownership with 10 percent of the \$6,300 purchase price forfeited.

The site of the plant is a former city sewage treatment plant and is located on a rail spur. Logs Lacking  
Dame cited the lack of logs in Utah as the prime reason for his decision to move west.

He said he has been investigating possible sites for the past year and eventually narrowed his choice to the South Oregon—Northern California area.

This area is the property source as far as lumber is concerned. Dame commented: "The lumberman envisions moving all of the equipment from the present Dame Lumber and Milling Company plant in Kanab to Klamath Falls."

He said some of his employees also will make the move. The new plant will specialize in millwork.

Payroll Estimated  
Dame said the moving of the plant to Klamath Falls will mean a payroll here of more than 30 men.

But Dame said, he hopes to develop his supply and distribution sources to a point which will allow him to operate on a smaller scale.

Choir To Sing  
Directors approved the KUHS A Cappella Choir's singing before an Oregon Education Association meeting in Portland March 26.

They accepted the resignation of English teacher Colin Fendler and hired 23-win Shores of Portland to replace her.

Directors approved an application for National Defense Education Act funds for the KUHS foreign language program and ordered the drawing of plans for improvement of the high school track. This improvement probably will include laying of a permanent curb.

## Mob Stones U.S. Office In Moscow

MOSCOW (UPI)—A mob of 3,000 American and Russian students attacked the U.S. Embassy in Moscow today in protest against American reprisal raids on North Vietnam.

Police stood by while the mob shattered windows in the building. At least three persons were hurt in the hour-long demonstration. American correspondent Adam Clymer of the Baltimore Sun said he was beaten by the demonstrators.

Another newsmen, Bernard Ullman of Agence France Presse, was cut near the eye by a flying object. An Asian student was seen with blood streaming down his face.

The demonstrations followed stern Soviet warnings that the U.S. reprisal raids on North Vietnam could harm U.S.-Soviet relations. About 200 blue-coated police rushed to the scene to "keep order." They did nothing to prevent the students from shattering every window on the first two floors with a barrage which included snowballs and hunkies of ice.

Many of the screaming students barged past the policemen to plant protest banners in Chinese characters on the black iron fence in front of the embassy.

## Board Allocates Funds From Klamath UF Drive

## Cong Guns Drop 3 U.S. Choppers

SAIGON (UPI) — Communist ground fire shot down three U.S. Army helicopters in an action 30 miles east of Saigon today. One American crewman was killed and eight others were wounded.

The helicopters were among 51 flying government troops into action against a guerrilla force. Heavy fighting was reported on the ground. Vietnamese paratroopers lost nine men killed and 38 wounded. Eighteen enemy bodies were found.

The fighting broke out soon after the United States brought in a battery of deadly Hawk anti-aircraft missiles at Danang, 50 miles north of Saigon, and declared them ready for use against possible air attacks by Communist pilots.

Anticipate Reprisals  
The rockets were placed around the Danang base on orders of President Johnson. Military officials anticipated possible reprisals.

The battle in which the American helicopters were hit was in the Binh Gia region where more than a thousand Viet Cong rebels battled government troops for a week earlier this year and dealt them their worst defeat of the war.

Maj. Robert W. Heuber, 34, said the first helicopter crashed and burned early in the attack, killing a crewman and injuring two. Other helicopters rescued the wounded men. Six more Americans were wounded when two other helicopters were hit.

They also were rescued under the protection of rocket and machinegun-equipped "ships."

It was the toughest Chinese statement in a series which have been issued since the U.S. and South Vietnamese retaliatory air raids against North Vietnam.

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
