Playing rules are that each team is lined up under the opposite team's basket, standing beside their donkeys. When the whistle is blown, players may mount and ride, or pull their donkeys to the ball. The ball is passed from one to another, and players must be mounted to receive the pass.

A player may not touch the ball unless he is mounted or has the reins in hand. No one may hold the ball more than 15 seconds. Scoring may be done only from astride the donkey. Free substitution is permitted at any time.

There are no out-of-bounds, time-outs or fouls. Players are requested not to pull donkeys' hair, ears or tails.

Donkeys are traded within each team at the quarter and teams must switch sets of donkeys to start the second half. Each player is responsible for his own animal when it is on the floor. Kris Spielman, var-
