Nicklaus Ready For Phoenix

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Big Jack Nicklaus, rounder champion, opens defense Thursday of the first of four titles he won in 1965 when the \$55,000 Phoenix Open golf tournament gets under way at the Arizona Country Club.

Nicklaus will be playing in only his third tournament of the year. But the old touch is coming back — if it even went away.

"I'm hitting the ball real good and can't complain about anything," said the Backey's better.

In two starts this year, Jack finished in a tie for third in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, picking up \$3,666.66; and also in the tie for third in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, winning \$3,100.

So the money-winning king is on his way to what looks like another big cash season.

His main competition here is expected to come from Bill Casper, who won the Bob Hope event last week and who has collected more than \$27,000 at ready this year.

Casper, slimmed down to a trim 200 pounds, is playing the most consistent game of his life. He has finished ninth or better in 17 out of the last 18 tournaments while winning something like \$70,000.

But the other stars are on hand, too. They include include British Open champion Tony Lema, who also won such events in 1964 as the Buick Open, the Thunderbird and the Bing Crosby; Australian Bruce Crampton, who captured the Bing Crosby this year; PGA champion Bobby Nichols and San Francisco Lucky International king George Archer.

BUCK TALK And Bird Calls

In the legislature, these are some of the major actions under consideration pertinent to the wildlife resources of the state, and their administration:

House:
HB 1206: At the request of the Wildlife Interim Committee, would consolidate the Oregon Game Commission and Oregon Fish Commission into a single "Fish and Game Commission."

HB 1213: At the request of the game commission, provides for an upward adjustment in the basic angling and hunting license and tag fees.

HB 1159: At the request of the Wildlife Interim Committee, establishes the Interstate Deer Herd Advisory Committee. The committee has already been appointed and will meet initially in Klamath Falls on Feb. 27. No further bill action scheduled until March 8.

HB 1182: At the request of the Wildlife Interim Committee, would prohibit shooting game from a tree or other elevated structure eight feet or more above the ground.

Senate:
SB 64: At the request of the

Wildlife Interim Committee, limits an individual to not more than one deer, elk or antelope tag per year.

SB 72: At the request of the Wildlife Interim Committee, would prohibit carrying loaded firearms in a vehicle during hunting seasons.

SB 114: At the request of the game commission, would require a license to angle on all fish, not just game fish.

SB 132: At the request of the Jackson County Chapter, Oregon Fish and Game Council, would repeal statute allowing separate Rocky Mountain and Roosevelt elk tags.

Resolutions:
HJR 6: Directs game commission to equalize fish and game expenditures in proportion to respective incomes.

HJR 7: Establishes a one-mile buffer zone (refuge) along state line bisecting the interstate deer herd migration route.

SJR 7: Directs game commission to undertake experimental big game feeding programs.

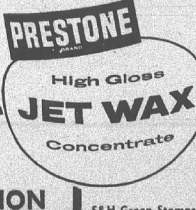

NEW YORK (UPI) — A salami faraway look steals across Whitey Ford's normally happy features each time he stops to think what's left for him if his arm doesn't come around.

Realistic as he is, the 36-year-old Yankee left-hander still doesn't consider that possibility too often. Not so much because it frightens him, but because he's convinced his operation was successful and he'll be able to pitch again as well as always.

"I'm sure everything will turn out all right," he said Tuesday after signing a \$60,000 contract, which represented his highest one ever.

Has Other Irons
"If it doesn't, it doesn't," Ford pursed his lips and that strange look clouded his face again.

"I have a few things going for me on the outside. My family wouldn't be destitute," he said, forcing a smile. "What I'd like to do if I couldn't pitch would be to stay in baseball at least another year or so. But I'm not worried. I'm pretty sure my arm is okay."

The surgery performed on Ford in Houston three months ago was done to relieve a circulatory condition.

"They cut me here," he said, drawing his finger from the left

side of his chest to his armpit, "and they went in pretty deep. They worked on some nerves right beside the heart."

Pain In Forearm
"I used to get pain in my left forearm before the operation if I did any work. They told me the blood wasn't getting back fast enough."

As a result of the operation, Ford says he has no pulse beat in his left hand. He also perspires on the right side of his body but not on the left.

The long-time Yankee ace hasn't tested his arm seriously since the surgery was performed last Nov. 9.

"Oh, I've thrown a football in my backyard... I dunno, about 20 yards I guess... and I've thrown a tennis ball to my dog, but that's all. There was no pain at all."

Celtics Undoubtedly Will Win NBA Crown

The Boston Celtics undoubtedly will win the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Association this season with ease, but either Cincinnati or Philadelphia look ready to give the Celts the fight of their lives in the playoffs.

Cincinnati Tuesday night broke a seven-game losing string to Boston by thumping the defending NBA champions, 134-121, before 7,532 fans at Cincinnati Gardens. And Philadelphia made it nine wins in 11 starts since Wilt Chamberlain joined the team with a 132-114 win over San Francisco. St. Louis nipped New York, 100-101, in the night's other NBA activity.

Cincinnati's win still left the Royals 11½ games back of the Celts, but it showed the Royals are ready for Boston in the playoffs — providing Cincinnati can get past Philadelphia in the first round of action.

Oscar Robertson hooped 42 big points in Tuesday night's contest before leaving to a standing ovation, while benchwarmers Hal Halston and Bud Olsen added 22 and 16 points in impressive shows. Sam Jones hit 28 for the Celts.

The 76ers tangled with the Warriors at San Jose, Calif. San Francisco operated without injured Nate Thurmond at center and his substitute, Connie Dierking, played a sharp game. He scored 30 and held Chamberlain, the loop's top scorer, to 23 despite a four-inch height disadvantage. Dierking was one of three players obtained from Philadelphia in the big trade that sent Chamberlain back to his home town.

Fleasty 76er backcourt ace Hal Greer tallied 31 points and big rookie Lucious Jackson added 20 more, while no other Warrior was able to swing more than 17 points.
