### Senate Committee Studies Safety On Beaches

 SALEM (UPI)—The best way to keep drivers from running over children and dogs on Oregon's beaches was taken up by a Senate committee Tuesday.

A detailed recital of the abuse of driving privileges on the beaches developed so much interest in the State and Federal Affairs Committee that Chairman Glen Husted, D-Lebanon, said he would schedule another hearing in about three weeks.

He said county judges and commissioners of coastal counties, state police and highway commission members would be invited to testify.

Two Bills  
 The committee has two bills regulating beach driving. One sponsored by Sen. R. F. Chapman, D-Coos Bay, would take jurisdiction over the beaches away from the Highway Department and give it to the counties. The counties could then abolish or regulate automobile traffic.

The other measure, sponsored by Sen. Ted Hallock, D - Portland, would simply ban automobiles and airplanes from the beaches except in emergencies. Chapman said cars have been hitting both dogs and children, that law enforcement authorities aren't trying to enforce speed laws and that county officials could do a better job.

Hallock called the beaches near Seaside "a hot rodder's paradise" and some of those in the south "a 70-miles-per-hour grand prix."

However, Rep. Paul Hanne-man, R-Cloverdale, a fishing re- port operator, said he thought the problem had been magnified out of proportion.

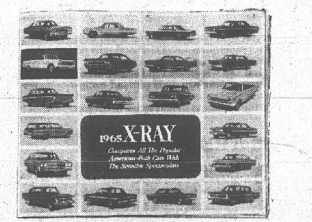
