

# Legislation Aids Law Enforcement

Passage of bills to permit a separate and serious police officer convicted to on probable cause and to offense for attempting to elude an increase of convictions in traffic cases last year compared to past years, the Department of Motor Vehicles has reported.

The department said that reported convictions for driving while under the influence of liquor totaled 4,152 last year, an increase of 28 per cent over 1963. In all, 271,559 traffic convictions were reported by Oregon courts.

"This drinking driver figure undoubtedly is attributed in a large measure to the fact that police last year were able to arrest on probable cause at accident scenes," according to Vern L. Hill, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Prior to September, 1963, police could not arrest or cite unless they personally witnessed the violation involved in an accident.

Hill also noted that 281 driver licenses were suspended by the licensing agency as a result of court convictions for attempting to elude a police officer.

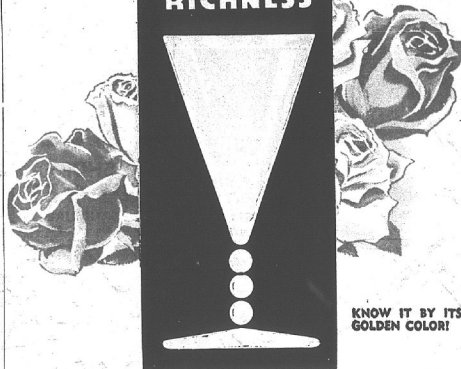
The study found that most private foundations "act responsibly and contribute significantly to the improvement of our society."
