Bizarre Accident Claims Life Of Basketball Star

LOGAN, Utah (UPI) — Big Wayne Estes, Utah State University basketball star who died in a bizarre accident, was taken today to Montana where he started his career for certain All-American glory.

Estes' hometown of Anacona, a closely knit smaller community, scheduled two funeral services — require files at St. Mark's Episcopal Church Friday and a public service a half hour later in the Anacona Senior High School Memorial gymnasium.

Only one opening night winner was able to cling to his lead in the second round of action at Holiday Bowl in the 21st Annual Men's Association Bowling Tournament, as the Make-Ups, in B-Division, emerged in first place after two rounds of competition.

Azusa College Has Best Cage Record Of Teams On West Coast

By United Press International The basketball team with the best record on the West Coast is not UCLA, San Francisco, Seattle or Fresno State. It is Azusa College, which Tuesday night roared to its 18th win in 20 games with a 107-79 romp over BIOLA.

Azusa has been led most of the season by Gary Presteser, one of the nation's most prolific small college scorers. But a leg injury sidelined him, possibly for the season, three games ago and Azusa goes on winning anyway. Art Jenkins hit 31 for Azusa Tuesday night.

In the only major West Coast college action Tuesday, Oregon State breezed past Hawaii, 92-68. For the losers, Jones scored the Terry Dreisewer 18. Jim Jarvis, the Beavers' backcourt great, settled for 12 but lifted

his career total to 97 to be now 124, edged San Diego, now all-time scorer. The Beavers' 144, by a score of 60-47.

Meanwhile, United Press International college basketball rankings showed Fresno State in eighth place on the basis of its 15-5 record.
