

Mystery Buyer Gets Famous Van Gogh Art

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—The best known works of Vincent Van Gogh belong to a mystery buyer who paid \$900,000 for it and six other paintings of the 19th century French master.

Van Gogh's "The Sower" was bought for \$250,000 Tuesday night at a society auction here by New York City attorney Roger Oresman, on behalf of a client he declined to name.

Oresman was by far the heavy-

est bidder in the sale of 25 works of French impressionist and post-impressionist painters which brought a total of \$1,425,000.

Oresman, who said he represented the firm of Milbank, Tweed, Hadley and McCoy of New York, said only that the firm represented "buyer." He would not say who.

About 900 people in all crowded the Trosby Galleries for the auction, among them some of the winter social set and agents and dealers representing European as well as American interests.

The crowd was put in two other rooms besides the main gallery, and the bidding was by closed circuit television and an intercom system.

Brokers Threaten To Block Stock Quotations

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A group of Pacific Northwest stock brokers and dealers today threatened court action to block publication of wholesale quotations for stocks traded over-the-counter.

The National Association of Securities Dealers Inc. (NASD) will file for a court restraining order, if the association goes through with its plan to publish wholesale quotes.

An attorney for the group, most of whom do business in the Portland, Ore., area, has an appointment with U.S. District Judge Bernita Matthews here Thursday.

The group was reported to feel that publication of wholesale quotes would be "extremely damaging" to small brokers, since it would force them to lower their commission fees. Small dealers doing a small volume of business can not make money with lower fees, the spokesman said.

This system amounts to price fixing and has finally persuaded the NASD to publish wholesale quotations.

A spokesman for some 15 broker-dealers, all of them NASD members, said his group will file for a court restraining order, if the association goes through with its plan to publish wholesale quotes.

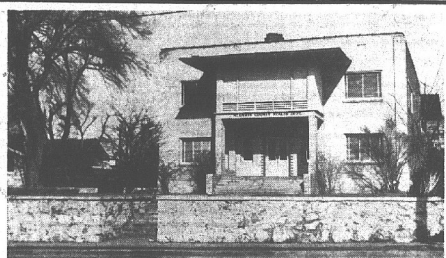

Savant Sues Over Polio

PORTLAND (UPI)—Testimony was under way today in a \$1 million suit brought by Oregon State University Prof. Paul O. Richter, 54, who said he contracted polio after taking oral vaccine.

The suit is expected to take from 10 days to two weeks. It is being heard by a jury of nine men and three women in Federal Court.

Richter said he got polio in 1962 after taking the oral vaccine, manufactured by the Charles Pfizer Co.

Richter was present in court Tuesday, in a wheelchair.

He is head of the entomology department at Oregon State. Herbert Muller, Portland, testified for the plaintiff Tuesday. He said he was employed as a salesman by Pfizer in 1962 and that he set up the polio vaccine program in Benton County. He said the program encouraged the local medical society to send out releases for news media.

It deals with a suggestion for protective steps which could be taken to control and save water originating in the Klamath country by Proebstel, then living in Bly.

Proebstel pointed out that around the headwaters of the north and south forks of the Sprague River, Fish Hole Creek and Pole Creek, the terrain formed big natural catch basins capable of holding millions of feet of water.

He suggested a line of small dams, illustrated on a hand-drawn map, to hold back the usual spring water surplus. Each dam on specified sites would contain the runoff in natural catch basins. He also suggested damming the Sycan far north of where it enters the Sprague, and the Williamson above its confluence with the Sprague at Chilquin.

These natural catch basins would also have been stocked with fish.

All of the streams make up a source of the Klamath River.

Proebstel said at that time, "it only seems reasonable that if the lower part of the Klamath is to be put into jeopardy by the need of Central and Southern California for reliable sources of water, Klamath County and Oregon should be interested in storing and making use of water this area produces as near the source as possible."

The idea lies in with the present flood situation in Klamath County.
