Red China Said Ready For Battle

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China said today it is prepared to carry any Asian war with the United States "to the very end." Peking charged that U.S. air attacks on North Viet Nam could lead to such a conflict.

Communist China's latest propaganda broadside was launched as Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kossygin arrived in Peking on route back to Moscow at the end of a four-day visit to North Viet Nam.

The belligerent statement was published in the form of an editorial in the Peking Peoples Daily, the official newspaper of the Communist regime. It was broadcast by the New China News Agency.

"We mean what we say," the editorial said. "If U.S. imperialism is bent on spreading the war flames and imposing war on us, then we shall have no alternative but to go along with it to the very end."

"In that event, the whole of Southeast Asia, the whole of Asia would be aflame with the revolutionary fire in which you (the United States) will be so burnt to death that not even your ashes would be traceable."

The editorial appeared amid the third day of anti-American demonstrations in Peking. The New China News Agency said more than 1.5 million Chinese took part in today's protest against the U.S. retaliatory air raids on North Viet Nam.
