

Solons Hear Plea For Tight Firearm Control

SALEM (UPI)—Repeat of a 4-year-old law requiring a gun license for alien hunters provided a forum for advocates of tighter firearm control in the House today.

The bill repealing the law, which had been considered to turn the obsolete statute into a uniform move to send it back to committee received only scattered support in a voice vote.

Rep. Irvin Mann Jr., R-Stanfield, said it apparently was intended originally to be used to restrict hunting by aliens, especially those of southern Europe

an extraction, who refused to abide by other laws.

However, Rep. Keith Skelton, D-Eugene, asked if any attempt had been considered to turn the obsolete statute into a uniform gun registration law for all Oregon residents. Mann replied there had been no such discussion.

Rep. Juanita Orr, D - Lake Grove, then moved to send the bill back to committee. She said the state "should keep on the books any deterrents to any foreign person" carrying firearms in the state. She said if such a

law had been in effect in Texas, President Kennedy might not have been assassinated.

"This bill isn't going to keep any dangerous alien from carrying a gun," replied Rep. Carroll Howe, R-Klamath Falls. He said the bill was an affront to many foreign visitors.

Voting against the measure in addition to Mrs. Orr and Skelton were Reps. Grace Peck and J. E. Bennett, both D-Portland.

In other action, the House passed bills requiring resident

agents for foreign insurance companies doing business in the state, deleting the requirement that the State Game Commission must hold its meetings in its Portland office, simplifying procedures for issuing temporary vehicle registration permits, and providing that county property tax returns could be made available to the secretary of state and other public agencies.

The latter two measures were passed by the Senate and now go to the governor. The others will go to the Senate.

Hatfield Assails LBJ's Farm Plan In Address For SCD Convention

PORTLAND (UPI)—President Johnson's agricultural budget proposals were assailed in a speech by Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield at the 19th annual convention of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation districts Tuesday.

His speech was applauded by the 1,200 delegates attending the five-day convention, which ends Thursday.

Hatfield said he appreciated

the need for economy in government and also the desire to free agriculture and the American taxpayer from dependence on direct subsidies.

But, he said, "I cannot in good conscience endorse a proposal whereby proven practices would be eliminated at the very time the basic source of our resource wealth demands coordinated effort on the part of all

participants if we are to meet the challenges of the future."

He earlier referred to President Johnson's State of the Union address wherein he declared intent to reduce heavy farm program costs and direct more help to the small farmer.

"It now appears there will be little change in the massive federal subsidy program," Hatfield
