

Scientist Expects Moonmen To Find Remains Of Ocean

DENVER (UPI) — When American astronauts land on the moon, they may find the remains of a "primitive ocean" nearly as old as earth itself. They may also find much of the lunar surface covered with a sandy material from 10 yards to more than a half-mile deep. These are scientifically controversial viewpoints, but some 1,000 delegates to a Denver space symposium listened carefully to them because the speaker was Dr. Harold C. Urey, professor of chemistry at large at the University of California.

Urey's credentials are impressive. Among his accomplishments are the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 1934 and his role as a leading researcher for the production of heavy water and uranium-235 for the first atomic bomb.

As a scientist, Urey delights in thinking for himself. While other scientists insist that the moon is probably worthless except as a geologic curiosity, Urey contends that lunar-landing astronauts have at least a "50-50" chance of discovering the residue of some long-dead ocean.

Such a primitive sea, "smelling far worse than the swamps of today," may once have been a part of the bodies that became the moon and earth, says Urey. He added that this could account for meteorites whose interiors have been found to contain what some experts contend are biologic-like remains.

The meteorites were once a part of the moon that was dislodged and sent hurtling toward the earth by a crashing comet, he believes.

He said similar meteorites may also be found on the planet Mars.

Such particles on the moon, he says, "should contain a primitive record of evolution, much older than the records on earth. I think it would be very, very interesting to have some idea of the sort of conditions that existed when life was formed."

The United States has two more Ranger probes scheduled for flights to the moon — one within the next few days and the second in mid-March. Urey says targets for these already have been selected—but he declines to say where they are.

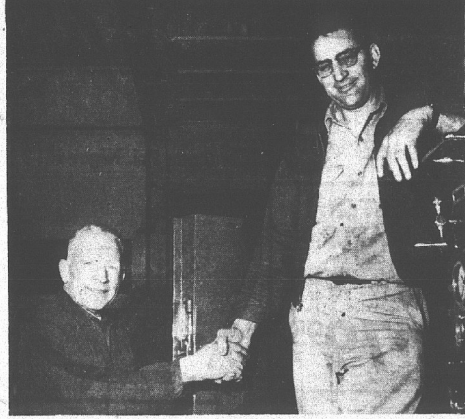

BOON (UPI) — West German bar keepers have begun selling tell yourself if you're getting drunk balloons.

The balloons change color according to the amount of alcohol on the breath of the person blowing them up.

The man who put the balloons on the market, in department stores as well as bars, said that within a week he had calls for 1.6 million of the gadgets.

The balloons were offered after stricter traffic laws made it an offense to drive while drunk even if the driver was not involved in an accident.

Police have used balloons for about six years. They are not admitted in German courts as evidence, but police say the balloons help them decide who to pull in for a blood test.
