PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)—The \$67,500 Phoenix Open, the golf tournament that develops money-winning champions, gets underway today and the winner will be the man with the lucky put.

The defending champion is Jack Nicklaus, and after capturing the crown last year, he went on to win the national money-winning championship. The winner here in the previous two years was Arnold Palmer, and he captured the money title both times, too.

Palmer isn't here this year, but Bill Casper is on hand to build up his bank account. Big Bill leads the money statistics this season, with \$27,000 to his credit — \$13,000 more than any one else during the first five weeks of competition.

Nicklaus and Casper are the pre-tournament favorites.

But the lad who can't be overlooked is Frank Beard. The Louisville, Ky., slugger is fifth on the money list this year with more than \$9,000 in paychecks.
