Rodriguez Opens Bid For Title

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban Luis Rodriguez of Miami Beach, a slick but very rugged ex-sellerweight champion, opens his bid for a shot at the middleweight crown tonight in a 10-rounder against slugger Rubin Carter, latest middleweight challenger.

For this boxer-puncher battle at Madison Square Garden, speedy Rodriguez is favored at 7-5 because his backers believe that Carter of Clifton, N.J., must knock him out in order to win.

No one ever knocked out 27-year-old Luis in his 62 bouts — a list that includes victories over all eight middleweights Rodriguez has faced.

Although only a fair puncher, Rodriguez scored 22 knockouts among his 57 victories.

Bull-shouldered Carter, who tries to end each fight as expeditiously and quickly as possible, has making his first start since Dec. 14, when he lost a unanimous but controversial decision to middleweight champion Joe Giardello in his title 15-rounder at Philadelphia.

With five contests remaining this season, two of them non-conference tilts with Cascade College, the Oregon Tech Owls face their stiffest test of the season at home tonight and tomorrow night, with the invasion of Oregon Collegiate Conference league — leading Eastern Oregon Mountaineers.

While the Owls yielded to the Mountaineers in mid-January in a two-day stand at La Grande, the visiting club also faces a formidable task in trying to crack the home town "jinx."

The jinx this year comes in the form of a near perfect home court record. The Owls have been a only once on their own hardwood, and in this one defeat they yielded by one single point.

Upset Victory
Oregon College of Education, the cellar dweller in the league earned this upset victory, after the Owls gave up three starters with two minutes left in a close ballgame. Adding to their woes, the Owls lost the services of Mike Werten, who was injured in the contest, and seriously hampered the outcome for the host club.

Eastern comes to Klamath Basin this season.

Falls with an impressive 7-3 conference record. Two wins this weekend would clinch the title for the Mountaineers, but two defeats would put the Owls in strong position for the title themselves.

Either way you look at it, both clubs have much to lose, and much to gain, and this should be, without a doubt, the finest cage battle in Klamath Basin this season.

Coach Jim Partlow's work is cut out for him tonight, as he selects the pattern to stop Eastern's high scoring combination, Randy Dalven of the Mountaineers scored 17 and 20 points

in the two previous Owl encounters, but high honors went to Dave Smith, who collected 53 points in the two games against the Oretech five. Smith collected 22 the first night, and 31 the next. Don McClain added another 26 points to the first night's efforts, and Craig Humphrey scored 11 and 18 in the two evenings of action.

Rich Lyons scored effectively during the previous outing, adding 53 points in the two nights. He scored game high of 34 in the opener. Mike Werten, still new to the club in that outing, collected 20 points the first

night, and six the following. LeVoy Young was constant in his efforts as he poked 13 through a first night and 15 the next.

The Owls took sole possession of the number two spot in the OCC last Tuesday when they ripped a visiting Red Raider crew apart at OTI gymnasium. The Owls jumped to an early lead, maintained it throughout and finished with an 82-61 verdict.

The strong show by the Owls was bolstered by effective board work on the part of Hank Albrecht, and steady inside shooting of big Will Robnett, who finished the contest with 18

points. Robnett has progressed steadily throughout the season, and is now one of the major offensive threats on the Oregon Tech lineup. His 56 frame lends considerable talent to the lineup.

Stronger Bench
Partlow is expected to start Rich Lyons and Hank Albrecht at forwards, Will Robnett at center, LeVoy Young and Mike Werten at guards. His bench has progressed well enough this year that he can substitute somewhat without seriously hurting the overall effectiveness of his starters.

Sure starters for the Mountaineers include Smith, Dalven,

McClain and Humphrey, all double figure scorers, and a threat to any opponent.

A preliminary contest tonight pits the Central Oregon College team against Oregon Tech's "Rock" squad coached by Larry Burleson.

Saturday night's preliminary (both prelims start at 6:15) features the Class B, Klamath County League Chiquin Panthers in action against the Rocks.

For two nights of great basketball, area fans should count on visiting the Oregon Tech gymnasium both tonight and tomorrow night.

Indoor Track Meet Records Fall Fast

NEW YORK (UPI)—Tommy Farrell of St. John's, happy holder of a new world indoor half mile record of 1:49.8, headed for Los Angeles today but showed with New Zealand's Peter Snell on Saturday night apparently is out.

"I'm going to run the 600 out there," said Farrell, with an obvious lack of interest in challenging Snell in the 1,000.

Farrell, fifth in the Olympic 800 meters won by Snell, blazed to his half mile record in the New York Athletic Club track and field games at Madison Square Garden Thursday night, scoring by four yards over Canada's Bill Crothers. Crothers held the listed record of 1:50, although Snell unofficially had done 1:49.9 indoors at Tokyo in 1962.

"Originally I entered the Los Angeles 1,000 but they asked me to drop down to 600 and that's where I'll race," said Farrell, a 21-year-old St. John's junior.

Jolanda Balas of Romania, two-time women's Olympic high jump champ, broke the world indoor mark with a leap of 5-8 1/2, shading the old record of 5-8 1/4 by Diane Gerece of Canada.

The West Coast's top basketball team gets one of its toughest tests of the year tonight when UCLA calls on the Washington Huskies at Seattle.

The nationally second-ranked Bruins barely escaped with their trousers when Washington dropped a 78-75 thriller at Los Angeles last Saturday. The Huskies will be primed for the upset at home tonight.

The Bruins, who lead the Pacific Athletic Conference by two games, are loaded with a bevy of All Coast Candidates and even a couple of possible All Americans in Keith Erickson and Gal Goodrich. But the Huskies have a gem of their own in center Lynn Nance, who rates at or near the top every league statistical category.

In more Pacific Athletic Conference action tonight, second-place Stanford hosts Oregon State, California greets Oregon, and Washington State faces Southern California.

Meanwhile, the West Coast Athletic Conference is even more of a walk-away. The USC Ducks hold a two-game lead and don't figure to lose it when they host west seakers Pepperdine and Loyola this weekend.

Loyola is at Santa Clara and San Jose State at Pacific tonight. Saturday, Pepperdine faces Santa Clara and St. Mary's is at Santa Barbara.

Aside from the mighty Ducks, the rest of the West Coast Athletic Conference is evenly matched. This was again proven Thursday night when San Jose State edged St. Mary's, 56-55, in a sloppily-played battle.

Mike Doherty, successful young basketball mentor of Washington High in Portland, last night was named a mentor coach at the new McNary High in Salem.

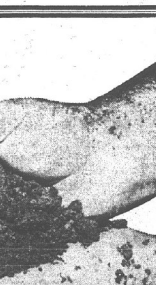
