Oregon Tech's Cosmopolitan Club, which is made up of 21 foreign students and several American students, is planning its own International Week program at Oregon Tech. The week-long affair will feature international dinners prepared by the individual students.

The dinners will consist of the cuisine of the home country. The students, in each case, will do the cooking in their own homes and bring it to the cafeteria. Guests will be invited and will be charged for the meal in a fund-raising project for the Cosmopolitan Club.

The public will be invited to tour the campus during the week and view the display of picture posters on bulletin boards in the Classroom Building and displays of educational materials in the library. There will also be a full-size flag display in one of the buildings.

Members are now contacting their embassies to get the materials necessary for the affair. Each evening the program will be dedicated to a certain country; for example, there will be Tanganyika Night, Persian Night, Congo Night, Singapore Night, etc., to which members of the student body will be invited. The week for these programs has not yet been selected.

A letter that Paul Chitwood, electronics professor, received from Donald R. Nyers, a 1964 electronics graduate, said, in part, "... had an opening for an electronics draftsman with some other electronic duties also. This was just what Bud was wanting ... also told me that there were quite a few applicants for the job, but just as I was picked out of 500 applicants."

Influenza Tops List Of Diseases

The incidence of influenza for the state since the first of the year rose to a peak during the week ending Jan. 30, when 495 cases of the disease were reported, according to the Oregon State Board of Health.

The peak represented nearly a one-third increase compared with the 330 cases noted during the previous week. The next highest incidence of the disease occurred during the week of Jan. 16 when 391 cases were reported.

Meanwhile, incidents of the disease in Klamath County fell to seven cases for last week from 13 cases for the previous report period. Other communicable diseases noted in the county were measles, 15; German measles and scarlet fever, three each; and infectious hepatitis, one.

The breakdown of communicable diseases in adjacent counties for the same period follows:

Deschutes, 10; Influenza, four; German measles, two; meningitis, pneumonia, measles, and non-infectious syphilis, one each.

Douglas, 49; Influenza, 41; pneumonia, six; tuberculosis and scabies, infection, one each.

Jackson, 10; Influenza, 24; measles, 12; German measles, 43; bac, dysentery, one.

Josephine, 18; Pneumonia, three; measles, four; German measles, nine; scarlet fever, two.

Lake, 20; Influenza, 14; measles, six.

Senate Okays Signal Ruling

SALEM (UPI)—A bill increasing to 100 feet the distance a turn must be signaled by motorists was approved in the Senate and sent to the House.

The Senate also approved a bill allowing several churches to submit late filings for property tax exemptions.

The present vehicle law requires turn signals for 50 feet. The 100-foot signal distance would apply in speed zones of 55 miles per hour or more.

Music for the affair, which is one of the highlights on Oregon Tech's social calendar, will be furnished by the Dancemasters. The first Sweetheart Ball was held in 1949 and during the early years, it was sponsored each year by the office machines technology class.

In recent years it has become a project of the Associated Student Body, usually in conjunction with one of the student organizations. This year the ASD and the Alumni Association will be co-sponsors. The public will be invited.

Eight members of the Oregon Tech faculty will attend the annual conference on college teaching which will be held at Oregon State University next week end. Professor Hiram Hunt will be a participant in the Physics Round Table panel. Others attending will be William King, Paul Meier, Paul Chitwood, Gene Wellman, Roy Green, Walter DuWane and John Goggin.

Herman "Bud" Smith, a local lawyer who has been practicing in Klamath Falls for about 10 years, is teaching the business law course at Oregon Tech. He began teaching in the part-time position at the beginning of winter term.

This year's class in analytical geometry is the largest ever and it is expected that the calculus class to be offered spring term will also be much larger than in previous years. There is pressure from Lawrence Radiation Lab and other space-age industries to have our students advance further in the areas of physics and mathematics and the students are responding en masse. If the trend continues, another room in the laboratory building will have to be converted into a physics laboratory before fall term next year.

Oregon Technical Institute Plans To Offer First Summer Study Program In 1965

Oregon Technical Institute is preparing to offer its first summer program in 1965. The program is approved by the State Board of Higher Education.

Institution of the program hinges on approval by the State Board of Higher Education at its March meeting.

Plans call for the program to offer English, mathematics, physics, business education and engineering.

The courses are designed to enable students planning enrollment at Oregon Tech to qualify as regular students if they do not otherwise meet entrance requirements. Students who are out-of-phase in their programs may use the summer session to streamline their education.

It is planned that the summer session will allow students contemplating a four-year program to complete prerequisite courses necessary to enter baccalaureate degree programs.

Other individuals seeking to continue their educations or improve already-learned skills also may take courses during the summer.

Oregon Tech officials said an expanded program will be offered during the summer of 1966 if this year's session is successful.

Persons interested in enrolling in the summer program were asked to contact W. M. Douglass, dean of administration, for further details.
