AAUW Foundation Offers Adult Counselor Program

A first-time program to develop specialized counseling techniques for adults seeking employment or retraining will be offered this summer by the American Association of University Women Educational Foundation.

A \$37,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Labor Office of Manpower, Automation, and Training will finance the Foundation's Adult Counselor Program. The eight-week workshop, which will run from June 14 through August 6 at the AAUW Educational Center in Washington, D.C. is open to women counselors who have a special interest in working with adults, particularly women long absent from the work force. These selected for this program will receive \$75 a week.

In addition to lectures and conference sessions, counselor-participants in the workshop will observe and will take part in adult counseling at public and private agencies in the Washington area.

Faculty for the program will be Dr. Virginia K. Kirkbride, professor of educational psychology at George Washington University; Dr. Kate Hemen Muelter, professor of higher education, Indiana University; and Mrs. Marguerite W. Zapoleon, economic consultant formerly with the Department of Labor. Dr. Eleanor F. Dolan, research director of the AAUW Educational Foundation, will direct the program.

The workshop is being offered, says Dr. Dolan, because of a conviction that a new type of counselor is needed to meet the demands of women who would like to enter or return to the work world but do not know how to go about it. "These women need a combination of personal, educational, and vocational counseling," continues Dr. Dolan. "Developing this manpower resource is quite different from working with younger people," she explains, "and the difficulty is compounded by the fact that few persons are qualified to counsel these adults."

Women interested in applying for this program are urged to write to Dr. Dolan, AAUW Adult Counselor Program, 2001 Virginia Ave., N.W., Washington 20, D.C., stating their education and experience.

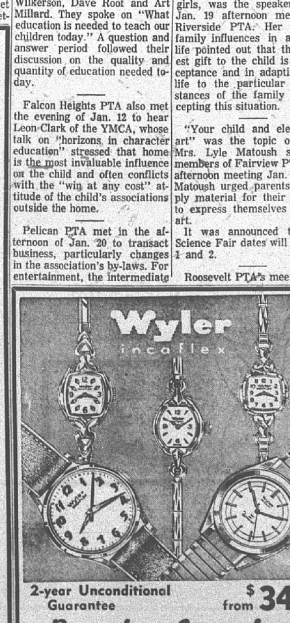
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
