3 Burglaries Reported To Officers

A burglar with an apparent penchant for parkettes was sought by Klamath Falls police today as the result of one of three break-ins occurring Saturday, city police disclosed Monday.

Paul Sandvoll, 1844 Idaho Street, reported that a Colt .22 caliber pistol, with a three- or four-inch jewel, was stolen from the Sandvoll home while she and her husband were bowling during the hours of 8:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. When the couple returned home they found the glass had been broken in a rear window and a jewel box containing the burglar. The thief did not steal the holster which contained the pistol.

In another incident, Mrs. Helen Logan, 333 Pulten Street, informed officers that someone entered her home while she was at work Saturday morning and ransacked drawers and cupboards before escaping with the victim's parket. The thief was discovered by Mrs. Logan's neighbor, Leroy Grover, who called at the house with the woman's grandchildren. Mrs. Logan said the burglar of her home had been untraced.

In one of the other burglaries, Jeanette Mairs, 323 North Sixth Street, informed officers that a thief broke through the rear door of her home and stole a fine ring jewel and two coins valued at \$150. Mairs said she reported the burglary to police and opened another box containing jewelry.

The county extension home economics program for the coming year is being planned now. Mrs. LeSueur will work with Klamath County Home Extension units to develop and carry out these and other home economics educational programs.

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Police Cite Motorist For Reckless Driving After Auto Hits Two Cars

A 20-year-old Klamath Falls motorist was cited for reckless driving early in the afternoon hours Sunday, after his car slammed into another vehicle and skidded some 70 feet into a parked automobile at the intersection of Division streets, Klamath Falls police reported Monday.

The incident was one of the four weekend traffic accidents in which as many motorists as were injured, none seriously.

Student Cited Charged with reckless driving was Pierre La Pierre, an OTI student residing at 6298 Kincheole Street, who was transferred to the Klamath Valley Hospital with rib injuries after a collision with the vehicle operated by Daniel Edgar Hoffman, 55, of 2349 Vine Street.

Officers said La Pierre was traveling at a high rate of speed and had crossed the center line when he collided with Hoffman's pickup truck, proceeding eastbound on Vine Street. The truck was coated with a light layer of frost at the time of the accident, police noted.

Another two-car accident near Vine Street, Robin Lynn Dunn, 16, of 947 Alandale Way, was cited for failure to yield the right of way when she drove her car from an alley onto East Main Street and collided with an auto operated by Larry Vaine Leady, 21, of 3138 Canyon Ave.

Miss Dunn said her pickup truck parked at the curb. Damage was extensive to both vehicles.

In a one-car collision that occurred 2:25 p.m., Sunday, the Evangelina Robinson, 28, of 3911 Shasta Way, was turning left from Shasta Way onto Lark Street when her brakes failed, causing the car to jump a curb and glance off a stone wall into a parked car owned by Miss Dorothy, 224 Shasta Way.

Brakes Defective Miss Robinson was cited for operating a vehicle with defective brakes and also for operating a motor vehicle alone, in violation of her driver's instruction permit.

Three persons were slightly injured in a two-car rear-end collision that occurred Saturday at Seventh and Main streets. The accident occurred when an automobile driven by Victor Sherman Vesteg, 33, of 4265 Bryant Street, struck an automobile stopped behind a line of traffic near the intersection of the two streets.

Youth Held For Theft The Lane County Sheriff's Office has in protective custody a 16-year-old Klamath County youth who was apprehended near Oakridge about 4 a.m. Monday while driving a car that had been stolen from Chemult about an hour earlier, Oregon State Police have reported.

The youth, yet unidentified, is being held for county juvenile authorities. The theft occurred about 3 a.m. Monday when Mrs. William Preston Robinson, Chemult, was awakened by the sound of the family automobile being driven away from the driveway.

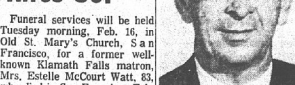

NEA Names LaClair To Position

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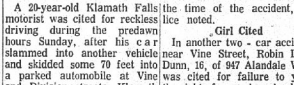

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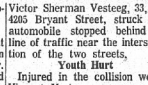
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
