### In The Day's News

A little while back, this writer's colleague, Eric Allen, editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, took his pen in hand for a brief discussion of the subject of SQUARES.

He put it like this:  
"Senator Margaret Chase Smith, the Republican lady from Maine, arose the other day in defense of the 'square'."

"Once upon a time, the 'square' shooter was a man to look up to. Square dealing was admired."

"Now, and this Senator Smith deplors, the term has come to mean someone who isn't quite with it, who isn't in, who falls out of any particular program in being hip, who may even, in fact, take suitable action if a woman is assaulted on the street."

"It may be merely a sign of approaching gray hairs, but we not only agree with the attractive Senator; we find those corners becoming more pronounced every day."

Hmmmmmmmmmm.  
Just what is a "square?"  
Let's go into the subject in depth.

The word "square," as referred to by Senator Smith, is a slang word. So let's go to headquarters for a definition. The Dictionary of American Slang is the last word on the subject. It starts with the good old phrase: "I've had my three SQUARES every day"—Meaning a SQUARE MEAL—which, it says was current as far back as 1894-70 years ago!

It then goes on with these definitions of a "square."  
"A person sacred because he is not in the know; not cognizant of, wise to or aware of the modern interests, groups, fashions or fads which the speaker considers vital; one who persists in being unworldly, unsophisticated, naive, old-fashioned, ignorant of current trends and interests, or unlighted, a patron considered as a sucker; one easy to deceive, trick or victimize because of his lack of worldly wisdom and knowledge of modern attitudes; one who accepts or believes without question all the popular cultural, ethical or political religious and social rationalizations."

"One who is not aware of, or probably incapable of, feeling sympathy toward or appreciation or understanding of boys and later far-out and beat attitudes or fashions. One who is not, and incapable of being, hip."

"One who is incapable of being hip. Still later, one who has no sympathy for or understanding of teen-age interests—especially of rock and roll attitudes. One who accepts, or, sentimentally and corn—especially in music or entertainment and life, one whose values, standards and judgments are those popularly prevailing."

## Viet Premier Picks Cabinet

SAIGON (UPI)—Buddhist Premier Phan Huy Quat today formally presented a 20-man cabinet to chief of state Phan Kha-C. Sun. He said he hoped to enlist South Viet military leaders to try to restore civilian rule.

The cabinet was made up of a wide spectrum of political and religious groups including Buddhists and Roman Catholics. It included a 56-year-old medical doctor, was appointed by the country's military leaders to try to restore civilian rule.

The gray-haired Quat, speaking to reporters after the formal ceremony in the crystal-chandelliered Gia Long Palace, stressed that the men in the cabinet were there as "Vietnamese citizens and not as delegates" of any power group.

Asked if the country's militant Buddhist hierarchy has pledged to support his government, he replied, "I would hesitate to say we have any agreements in paper. This is the fifth government since the overthrow of the late President Ngo Dinh Diem."

Quat's statements came against a background of threats by both Moscow and Peking. Soviets today demanded withdrawal of U.S. forces from Viet Nam and Moscow Radio warned that further U.S. attacks against Communist North Viet Nam could lead to a world war.

Chinese Communist Premier Chen Yi called Monday for the Soviet Union to take "concrete action" to aid China against "U.S. imperialism."

More Bitter Fighting  
On the fighting front military spokesmen reported two new bitter clashes with Communist guerrillas Sunday and Monday. In one action the government troops inflicted a defeat on Viet Cong but in the other they lost up to 70 men killed or missing.

And in a departure from custom an American military aircraft was shot down by Viet Cong and Marine helicopters killed 88 Viet Cong in a series of five clashes during the past 48 hours.

## Council Hears Objections To Street Paving Project

Heavy opposition to the proposed paving of Manzanita Street was voiced Monday night at a city council hearing which may have been illegal in the first place.

Opponents of the project testified that the estimated cost of the paving, \$10,382, is much more than the \$6,222 cost advertised in the legal notice of the hearing.

Even if the hearing had been proper, however, the project likely would have been killed. Mrs. Agnes Nelson, 312 North Eleventh Street, a Manzanita property owner, presented a petition she said carried the names of 12 of the 17 property owners along Manzanita.

She termed it a "signed protest petition."

Several property owners voiced their opposition, citing the high cost of the paving. It had been proposed that Manzanita be paved 3 1/2 feet from Crescent Avenue to the Southern Pacific tracks.

The estimated cost of \$10,382 is a \$42,600 per foot assessment. Other property owners voiced their favor to the project.

Mayor Veatch promised the property owners that "we'll look into the facts of the thing."

He said the legal notice mix-up will be investigated and will be determined if the 12 signatures displayed by Mrs. Nelson are proper, and sufficient to kill the project.

The hearing on Manzanita was one of several items discussed by councilmen pertaining to signs and public works.

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## Man Escapes As Car Dives Into Water

The passenger of a southbound auto miraculously escaped death by drowning, early this morning when the windshield popped out of the car after it had plunged into 10 feet of water at Algona Point.

Charles Robert Branstetter, 21 Stafford, Mo., was asleep inside the car when it struck the end of a guard rail and slipped into the pond. As the car settled at the bottom of the pool, Branstetter clutched the steering column inside the auto, saving his life by holding the opening left vacant by the windshield, and floated to the surface.

Driver Dozes  
The accident developed about 3 a.m. as Branstetter's wife Barbara, Lon, 17, fell asleep while driving the car, causing it to cross the northbound lane strike a guard rail, and carom into the pond. Mrs. Branstetter was thrown from the automobile as it struck the water and today ariped to the shore.

## U.S. Orbits Air Duster

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—A mighty Saturn-1 super rocket duster satellite with glass wings to measure the hazardous meteoroids pose to mankind was launched today.

The 186-foot booster, America's most powerful, thundered into the sky at 9:37 a.m. EST in the opener of a two-part nationally televised space spectacular to be followed Wednesday by a Ranger moonshot.

About 11 minutes after the fiery blastoff, space agency spokesmen said Saturn-1 had scored its eighth straight success by propelling the heaviest U.S. scientific satellite into orbit.

Tracking stations reported that the satellite was "working well." It is circling the earth every 97 minutes on an orbit ranging from 430 to 445 miles high.

The television camera on the spacecraft was flashing "excellent" pictures of Pegasus' broad wings to the tracking center at Aniqua.

## Russians Warn America Of Possible World War

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kossygin today demanded that the United States withdraw its forces from South Viet Nam.

The statement was reported by the Soviet news agency Tass in a message sent by Kossygin to a preparatory meeting of the Indochinese peoples conference in Phnom Penh, capital of Cambodia.

"The Soviet Union resolutely demands the withdrawal of U.S. troops and military equipment from South Viet Nam, the cessation of armed provocations against the Democratic Republic of Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia and the rejection of any military interference in the internal affairs of Indochina," Kossygin's message said.

Second Demand  
It was the second time in the past three days that Kossygin had made such a demand. A communique issued Sunday after Kossygin's meeting with North Vietnamese officials during his Asian trip termed the American air attacks on North Viet Nam "intentional and calculated on the United States to pull its troops out of Viet Nam."

The Soviet Union and Great Britain served as co-chairmen of the 1964 Geneva Conference which carved up Southeast Asia for the French Indochina war.

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## Architect Estimates Cost To Repair KF Civic Center

Architect Howard Perrin, original designer of the Klamath Auditorium, estimated today that an expenditure of from \$12,000 to \$150,000 would put the building in first class condition.

Perrin made his report at this morning's meeting of the Civic Auditorium Committee. Most of the service groups had representatives at the meeting.

The architect's preliminary plans—and it was emphasized they definitely are "preliminary"—include rebuilding the stage now considered too small, replacing the floor, painting the ceiling and out, sandblasting the outside of the building and making what repairs are necessary, and installing a new heating and air conditioning system.

Remodeling also would include a complete sound conditioning system. One of the major criticisms of the present building is poor acoustics making it impractical for concerts, conventions or large scale community meetings of various types.

Smaller Rooms  
Renovating the building, according to the architect's cursory planning, would include development of smaller rooms around the main floor which could be used for groups of different sizes. The rooms would

## Four Held in Plot On Liberty Statue

NEW YORK (UPI)—Authorities seized three men and a woman today and charged them with plotting to dynamite the Statue of Liberty, the Liberty Bell and the Washington Monument.

Three of those arrested were identified as members of extremist groups.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said all four were charged with conspiring to dynamite the three structures — traditional symbols of liberty and freedom in the United States.

FBI in Action  
The arrests of the three Negro men and one white woman were made by FBI agents and New York City police.

There was no immediate word on whether others were implicated in the three-city plot.

The three men were identified as Robert Steele Collier, 28, a self-styled leader of the "Black Liberation Front"; Walter Augustus Bove, 38, Philadelphia native and pro-Castro; and Khaleel Sulaiman Sayeed, 23, a Brooklyn native and graduate of Howard University School of Engineering in Washington.

The woman was identified as Michelle Duclou of Montreal, Canada, a member of a Quebec separatist party called Rassemblement Pour l'Independance.

Collier was said to have traveled to Cuba in 1964 with a group of other violators of the State Department travel ban.

Bove was described as a judo instructor at a New York settlement house.

The arrests culminated in an investigation which had been undertaken by city and federal authorities for some time.

An FBI spokesman said the four were arrested at different locations in New York City. A stack of dynamite and blasting caps was found buried in a lot at 60th West 239th St. in the Bronx.

This was only one part of the explosives which the four had sought to acquire, authorities said.

Hoover announced the arrest in Washington.

The four suspects were rushed to a police precinct headquarters here for questioning.
