LAKEVIEW - Approval of \$10,729 from the Red Cross disaster division for help to local individual residents in repairing damages from the Christmas week floods has been announced by Chick Sullaway, area Red Cross chairman.

Most of the money has already been spent for repair and replacement. About \$800 was to go to homes in Lakeview and the remainder to Paisley for homes there.

The funds were divided as follows: \$7,600 for buildings and repair to homes; \$553 for food, clothing and other maintenance; \$1,482 for home furnishings; and \$114 for occupational supplies.

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Community Considers Civic Center Possibilities

Many elements of the community are now in the throes of discussing the feasibility of either renovating the present Klamath Auditorium, in a building of steel, or constructing a new all-purpose civic center.

Renovation was proposed in December by the Klamath Board of Realtors. What piqued their interest in the project is the fact the State Board of Realtors will be meeting here in Klamath Falls next October.

In trying to find places which provided adequate room for the convention of 500 or 600 people the realtors found they had a knotty problem.

The statement often is made, "Why don't we use the facilities we already have in our schools?" For the most part this has proved impractical because at the very hour they are desired for some community affair—including a convention meeting—the gym, auditorium or whatever, are being used by the school. And this is the way it should be. The taxpayers pumpled up for facilities that should be used the maximum number of hours per day.

Another question is being asked today, "What should this new facility—or the renovated Klamath Auditorium—contain if and when funds may be available for such a project?"

being discussed now in many quarters and the committee studying the idea is taking such questions into consideration. A good example of an all-purpose operation is the Community Center at Midland, Mich. Midland is a city of 28,000, about the size of Klamath Falls, including the adjacent suburbs. The center was the dream of a Dr. Herbert H. Dow and a group of his friends. Originally, the center was to be built in 1916 as a non-profit corporation. A friend, Dr. E. O. Barstow, was an enthusiastic backer of the project and served as its president from 1918 until 1950. The present building, a beautiful structure

surrounded by picturesque grounds, was built in 1953.

Membership in the center is accessible to any adult who works or lives in Midland and who is a member of the Midland Community Fund. Its doors are open to all children who reside in Midland.

Facilities of the 1,500,000 cubic foot building include a wide range of recreational and educational activities. In addition to the space in the building, the Midland Board of Education makes available use of its gyms and the City Recreation Department offers use of its outdoor fields and parks for community Center programs.

Children's activities are held during the daylight hours and weekends. Evenings belong to the adults. The theme of the center is "Something for Everyone." A member can play basketball or handball, exercise on a steam bath or work out on a trampoline. There are rooms for dancing classes, recitals, wedding receptions, private parties and movies.

Other rooms are equipped with billiard tables, a meeting room for retired persons and the have their own social club, conference rooms and kitchenettes. Encourage Hobbies.

Hobbies are encouraged. For instance there is a photography workshop in the Midland Center complete with dark rooms and professional equipment. There are rooms for arts and crafts and classes are held in

Community Center is an excellent example of what can be done when industry's labor and management and the community joins hands to promote the common good together.

Who pays the freight? Funds to operate the Center come from three sources, the Midland Community Fund, miscellaneous fees and charges and from private contributions including some generous ones from Dow Chemical and the Dow Corning Corporation.

A large wing of the building is the Youth Center with recreational equipment for the various age levels. When Center programs are not scheduled it is turned over to other youth groups in Midland.

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Boy Scouts Get Funds From Spuds

Potatoes and lamb are providing a badly needed source of supplemental funds to finance the Boy Scout operations in this area.

Potatoes were added to the program recently when Karl Dehlinger made a donation at a lamb project. Over 75 feeder lambs have been donated by members of the Klamath Basin Sheep Producers' Association to the Modoc Council in the past two years.

Growers in the Tulelake area have donated potatoes to the council for use at Camp Malakula for many years. Scoutmaster O. E. Pederson has served as the organizer for this project. About 60 sacks per year have been donated for this purpose.

Growers who desire to support the Scouting program may make direct contributions of potatoes through their buyer or packing house.

Through projects such as these, it has been possible to extend the Scouting program to boys throughout the Basin. Most recent units have been established at Keno, Bonanza and Newell, with another scheduled for Bly.

United Fund support had not only a small part of the finances needed for Boy Scout operations. Several years ago Dorman Turner and Bryant Williams initiated a lamb project. Over 75 feeder lambs have been donated by members of the Klamath Basin Sheep Producers' Association to the Modoc Council in the past two years.

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Car Struck By Thieves

Clothing and other property valued at \$115 were stolen from an unlocked automobile parked in front of Lucva Italian Cafe, 2524 South Sixth Street, in one of two incidents of larceny from vehicles reported during the weekend, according to Klamath Falls police.

Howard estimated the value of the item at \$40 and stated his car was unlocked at the time of the theft.

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
