Legislative Action

SALEM (UPI)—The following measures were approved by the House Monday.

- HB 1075 — Allowing county clerks to combine precincts for state special elections.
- HB 1110 — Expands work relief program for welfare recipients to projects conducted by state and federal agencies and local taxing districts.
- HB 1317 — Allows secretary of state to set the price for the Oregon Blue Book.
- HB 1374 — Permits issuance of free temporary fishing licenses to inmates of Fairview Home and other state institutions.
- SJR 2 — Authorizes payment

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House Group Discusses Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Foreign Affairs Committee resumes hearings today on President Johnson's \$3.35 billion foreign aid bill.

The committee, headed by Rep. Thomas E. Morgan, D-Pa., is well into authorization hearings on the proposal, which is a "bare bones" request that is the lowest in history of the aid program.

Last year Johnson asked for \$3.5 billion in another pre-shrunk request. He finally received \$3.3 billion, which was a minor cut compared to some in previous years.

Easy Time Forecast
After the election gave Johnson a heavy Democratic majority in Congress it appeared that this year's bill would not have as much trouble as in some past sessions.

But there have been a series of recent incidents which included leaders of two countries — Indonesia and the United Arab Republic — making anti-American statements. Supporters of the program have been worrying since about the public reaction to the bill.

Other congressional news: Lobbyist: A Justice Department representative was to testify before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in favor of a bill aimed at tightening registration requirements for lobbyists working for foreign governments. The proposal passed the Senate last year but died in the House.

Disability: The House Judiciary Committee continued hearings on the proposed constitutional amendment to provide for succession in cases of presidential disability. Witnesses included a spokesman for the New York Bar Association and several members of Congress.

U.S. Reports Show Communist China Ready To Blast 2nd Nuclear Test

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has evidence that Communist China is now actively preparing for its second nuclear test, official sources said today.

It said that while the evidence was not conclusive, it indicated the blast could be detonated within a few days or several weeks.

It said it would come in the midst of the stepped-up confrontation with Asian Communists over recent U.S. bombings in North Viet Nam. Its effect on that confrontation would be hard to gauge.

Red China detonated her first nuclear explosion last Oct. 16, a test device said to have been short of an actually deliverable A-bomb.

Aware of Preparations
Western intelligence has been aware of preparations for that test well in advance, Secretary of State Dean Rusk made this knowledge public Sept. 29 in a "countdown" noted in September by preparing for its second nuclear test, "very shortly," U.S. sources said they now have received "some signals" that the same kind of preparation is now under way again. There always has been the possibility of technical difficulties which long delay a planned test.

The nature of the U.S. evidence was not disclosed. There have been published reports in the past of various named and unnamed reconnaissance planes over China, and that U.S. observation satellites are capable of monitoring the test site in Western China.

U.S. officials gave no support to reports that this time Red China could attempt to set off a thermonuclear explosion — an H-bomb. Some sources indicated strong doubts.

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Stolen Truck Found Near KF

A pickup truck that was stolen from Newport, last Friday has been located partially dismantled on Harpold Road, four miles north of Highway 38. Oregon State Police have reported.

The 1964 model vehicle was stripped of its motor, transmission and tires, officers said. The automobile is registered to Robert Longyear of the Oregon city.

Western Intelligence
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Negroes Push Battle On Alabama Vote Bars

A Negro voter registration drive moved deeper into rural Alabama Monday.

Martin Luther King Jr. urged Negroes to march on the Dallas County Courthouse at Selma again today.

About 1,200 Negroes followed King to the courthouse Monday. Then King ventured into Wilcox County, which has no Negro voters, and Perry County, which has only a relative handful of Negro voters.

Tense Situation
At Camden, Ala., in Wilcox County, King discussed voter registration procedures with a registrar who said "we're doing all we can," and a tense situation developed when a Negro man and a white woman, both civil rights workers, sat together on a park bench to pose for pictures. Tension eased when the sheriff appeared.

At Marion, Ala., in Perry County, the hometown of King's wife, about 100 Negroes staged a sit-in when the board of registrars closed for a meeting. But the demonstrators broke up an hour later.

Hearing Stated
The U.S. Civil Rights Commission scheduled a public hearing today at Jackson, Miss., into the racial situation in Mississippi. Several Mississippi officials were expected to testify. The commission held closed door hearings in Jackson last week.

Also in Jackson, a federal grand jury was to meet today, apparently to consider perjury charges against a number of Negro witnesses in voter discrimination suits, federal Judge Harold Cox and a U.S. attorney got into an argument at the last

grand jury meeting over the attorney's refusal to sign certain indictments. A federal appeals court, in a split decision, refused to cite the attorney for contempt.

Elsewhere:
New York: A civil court judge Monday ordered a city marshal to put Black Nationalist leader Malcolm X out of his home, which was hit with four fire bombs and set afire Sunday while Malcolm and his family slept. Malcolm and the Black Muslims blamed each other for the bombing.
