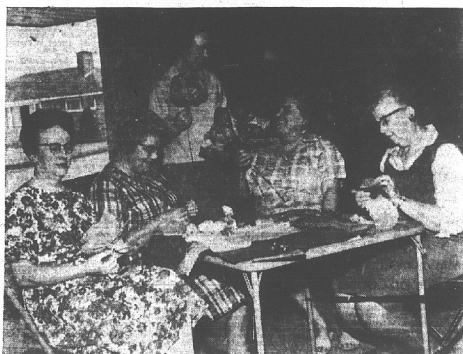

Hawaii's Perfume Industry Appears To Be Blossoming

HONOLULU — When perfume is mentioned, many people think of France—and the small town of Grasse (near the Cote d'Azur) where perfume is made. Now, however, almost every country contributes to perfumery.

For example, the perfume industry in Hawaii is about 35 years old. The idea for Hawaiian perfumes has stemmed from the profusion of flowers in the state. The available source makes it easy to obtain the quantities necessary for the extraction of basic oils from these flowers. These, in turn, are used in the formulation of a complete perfume of basic oils.

The perfume industry in Honolulu came into its own shortly after World War II. Due to the increasing visitor business in the state since then, Honolulu has been the leader in developing fragrances and unique Polynesian packaging to make the product more saleable.

The Hawaiian floral fragrances were chosen because they were the favorite lei flowers. The idea of placing a live Hawaiian blossom in perfume and toilet water was originated locally.

A combination of the technique and the use of the grass shock packaging have been the trademark of Hawaiian perfumes throughout the world. Brown's Hawaiian perfumes are now marketed in eight foreign countries and 35 of the mainland states of the USA, as well as in the District of Columbia.
