

Air Photos Show Ruin From Flood

PORTLAND (UPI)—A dismal picture of log and debris-choked coastal streams is being presented by State Game Commission personnel making aerial surveys of spawning waters, it was reported today.

George Kernan, chief engineer, said preliminary estimates on removal of log jams have been set "at not less than \$75,000." He said the figure could go much higher as surveys of other streams are completed.

Kernan said not only this year's run, but future migrations of steelhead, silver salmon and cutthroat trout are threatened by the blockades caused by the recent floods.

He said most of the jams are on tributary streams, some clogged over a wide area, while others were said to have from one to as high as 10 log jams which could block upstream migrations.

Kernan said that a huge log jam on the Kilchis River is typical of the pileups. He said the log accumulated in the exact spot where the commission had removed a massive blockade of salmon and steelhead less than a year ago.

Tax Lift Seen Aid To Auto Industry

DETROIT (UPI)—The chairman of the board of General Motors Corp. said Monday that the elimination of the 10 per cent federal excise tax on automobiles would give the American economy a lift.

Frederic G. Donner told newsmen elimination of the tax, which he called an "inequity," would have an impact on business generally that "would be very healthy."

Donner and GM President

John F. Gordon, who retires in a few months under the auto firm's mandatory retirement plan, discussed the excise tax and a wide range of subjects from pricing to tariffs in a rare open news conference.

Donner said he has often heard it said that elimination of the tax would boost auto sales by a half million units a year, but added that "I would not be able personally to back it up one way or the other."

He did say, however, that if Congress should eliminate the tax, the benefit would go directly to the buyer.

Donner said he would not predict whether or not Congress would act on elimination of the tax and that his estimate of car production in 1965 does not take such a cut into consideration.

PUC Chief Slaps Federal 'Lack Of Urgency' In Flood Aid

SALEM (UPI)—Public Utility Commissioner Joel Hill today expressed "grave concern about the lack of a sense of urgency" on the part of federal agencies in moving aid to victims of Oregon's Christmas week and January floods.

Hill was named by Gov. Mark Hatfield as a special troubleshooter to check out a swelling volume of complaints from flood victims.

"I can't tell if anyone has yet gotten any money," Hill told United Press International.

SBA Criticized
He was openly critical of delays on the part of the Small Business Administration (SBA) which had announced loan programs for homeowners and business firms.

"The bitter fact is that most flood losses will be borne by those who suffered them," Hill said.

Hill said the SBA "is moving terribly slowly."

At the same time he had high praise for the Office of Emergency Planning and Oregon banks and savings and loan associations.

Institution Praised
He said OEP was in contact with him "at least twice each day" in an effort to speed disaster aid. He said the Oregon lending institutions had stepped in to provide money in many cases.

Hill said much of the SBA problem resulted because the agency lacks money.

"Frankly, they're broke," he said.

He explained the Oregon Congressional delegation was attempting to get a supplemental appropriation for SBA, which was all but cleaned out of money by the Alaska earthquake.

He said lending institutions had been borrowing money at

4 per cent and loaning it to flood victims at 3 per cent as a stopgap move until SBA gets the money.

Loans Approved
As of Feb. 11, banks had approved 84 such loans totaling \$85,800.

But, he said, as of Feb. 16, SBA had approved only 16 loans totaling \$45,000, and he was not aware that any of the applicants

had yet received any money.

Hill cited one case where a person was advised his SBA loan application had been approved, and ordered a contractor to repair his house. The person then found out while the application was approved, it faced long processing delays, and there was no assurance the loan would actually be granted.

Hill said he had been trying

to stress the urgent nature of the problem in his dealings with SBA officials, but that SBA directors have countered "we must follow procedures."

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LBI Lauds Flood Area

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson today praised as "extremely gratifying" the courage of flood disaster victims in Oregon and Northern California and the response of the public and private agencies aiding them.

The White House made public a letter to the President from Robert W. Sarnoff, board chairman of National Broadcasting Co., and co-chairman of the 1965 American National Red Cross campaign. Sarnoff wrote Johnson a report on a recent inspection trip.

Sarnoff said he was a "profoundly moved by the scenes of overwhelming destruction" in the devastated areas. He said he was particularly impressed that more than 5,000 Red Cross volunteers and 350 staff workers had pitched in to help the disaster victims. He also noted the "overwhelming spirit of cooperation" among military, public and private agencies during the emergency.

"Apparently the crisis has not yet passed," said Sarnoff in his letter, dated Feb. 5. Sarnoff said that his personal inspection led him to believe "that the greatest assets in rehabilitation are, and will continue to be, the courage and strength of the victims themselves and of all who are helping them."

Johnson wrote: "It is extremely gratifying to know of the wonderful response of both public and private agencies to the needs of the disaster victims. I am convinced as you are that the courage and strength of the victims and of those who are aiding them will be sufficient to insure rehabilitation of the area."
