

Oregon Tech Hosts OCC Wrestling Tournament

Seattle Cage Stars Arrested For 'Fix'

SEATTLE (UPI) — Seattle University's dream of another postseason basketball bid lay crushed today by the arrest of two stars charged with conspiring to shave the point spread in a game.

Capt. Charlie Williams, 21, chief engineer of Seattle's whitening fast break, and utility guard Peller Phillips, 21, Detroit, were arrested by the FBI here Wednesday night.

J. E. Mines, special agent in charge of the FBI here, said the two conspired with Leo Casale, 24, owner of the Action-Go-Go Lounge in Chicago, to shave the point spread in Seattle's Jan. 22 game with the University of Idaho.

Seattle, now 17-4 for the season and winner of its past 10 games, won the game 88-72. The Chieftains were ahead by 24 points but numerous turnovers in the second half enabled the Vandals to cut into the Chieftain lead. Williams scored 16 points in the game.

Williams, son of a Baptist minister at Tacoma, and called by Coach Bob Boyd "the finest guard I have ever had" is a cat-quick 6-foot-6 who averaged 20.35 points per game in 23 games.

Phillips, a 5-foot-10 whirlwind, has not seen as much service but often teamed with Williams in igniting Seattle University's famed fast break. Both are guards.

In its complaint, the FBI said the three men "did conspire with each other to carry into effect a scheme or plan in commerce to influence a sporting contest by bribery, to wit, a basketball game played between Seattle University and the University of Idaho on Jan. 22, 1965."

Father Timothy Cronin, S.J., said Boyd and the school dismissed the players before the arrests Wednesday.

"I have never been so shocked at anything," said Eddie O'Brien, athletic director and

one of the famed O'Brien twins who with brother Johnny helped write basketball history at the school.

"You could tell me almost anything but this and I'd believe it," said O'Brien. "The team has been playing so well and been winning their games."

Williams and Phillips were arraigned before U.S. Commissioner Walter J. Resburg almost immediately after the arrests and were released on \$1,000 personal recognizance bonds.

Casale was arrested at his residence, Dunes Motel in Chicago, and will be arraigned before a U.S. commissioner this morning.

The maximum penalty under the law is \$10,000 fine or five years in prison, or both.

Students housed in Bellarmine Hall on the Seattle University campus were stunned Wednesday night by the arrest of basketball stars Charlie Williams and Peller Phillips.

Williams and Phillips were arrested by the FBI on a charge of conspiring to shave the point spread in a game against the University of Idaho Jan. 22.

J. E. Mines, special agent in charge of the FBI here, said the two conspired with Leo Casale, 24, owner of a Chicago tavern, to manipulate the points in a game which Seattle won 88-72.

"At first I didn't believe it," said Paul Carrelia, a psychology major. "Then suddenly it was everywhere—just like that."

"We were stunned," Phil Hosenkamp, sophomore political science major said. "The guys said, 'We were pretty sure about going to the NCAA; we were riding pretty high and suddenly the bottom fell out.'"

The Rev. Laurence Donahue, dean of men, said the arrests hit him hard.

"It's difficult when you know the boys—when you're friends," he said.

LANIER SIGNS

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants announced today second baseman Hal Lanier has signed his 1965 contract, reducing the team's holdouts to five players.

The 22-year-old Lanier was brought up from Tacoma in the Pacific Coast League last year, and played in 98 games, batting .274.

Still without contracts are pitchers Juan Marichal and Bob Shaw; infielder Jim Davenport and outfielders Milt and Jesus Alou.

SPRAINS ANKLE

EUGENE (UPI) — Jerry Anderson, starting forward on the Oregon basketball team, suffered a severe ankle sprain during practice Wednesday.

A spokesman said the 6 foot, 4 inch senior from Medford would be a "doubtful participant" in this weekend's conference clashes with UCLA and USC in Los Angeles.

Also out with injuries is 6-9 center Gene Brockmeyer. He tore a ligament in the lower leg and also is listed as doubtful for this weekend's series.

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Football Coach Doc Andros completed his staff at Oregon State Wednesday with the hiring of Rick Brooks, a 23-year-old former Beaver defensive halfback.

Brooks played at Oregon State from 1960-1962 and also understudied quarterback Terry Baker.

He has been an assistant coach at Highland High School in Sacramento for the past year.

Andros now has a six-man staff.

Owls Rate As Strong Contenders In Meet

Fans have the opportunity to witness some of the finest collegiate wrestlers on the Pacific slopes this Saturday as Oregon Tech Owls host the Oregon Collegiate Wrestling Tournament.

Of the 10 weight classes contested, nine champions return. Only Oregon Tech's Hank Lohsbart, last year's 137-pound champion, is gone from 1964's tournament kings.

Portland State College, coached by Howard Westcott, must be favored to repeat for the fourth year in a row as champions. Westcott has three returning champions in Jim Langston, Rich Green and Les Brown.

All three were NAIA district champions. Brown was finalist in the national tournament as Spahr, a 1960 NAIA district champion, looked real tough in competition.

Lest Champion
Oregon Tech, faced with the perennial problem of losing athletes after two years because of graduation, lost its only champion of last year—Hank Lohsbart. However, runner-up Terry Bend, at 123 and third-place finisher, John Thomas, at 137 and Larry Lietz at 115 return.

Mike Blidnerback, fourth-place finish, also returns. Oregon Tech has finished in third place behind Portland State and Eastern Oregon the last two years even though the Raiders have yet to defeat the Owls in a match.

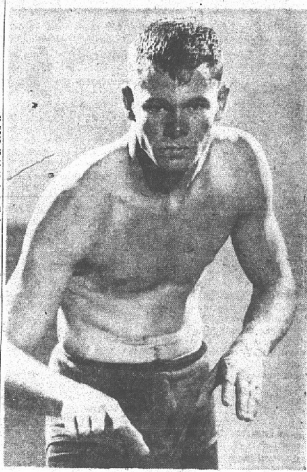

Tucson Open Is Perfect For Billy Casper's Game

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — Mas-sive greens are the biggest obstacles facing pro golfers in today's start of the \$46,000 Tucson Open which appears tailor-made for putting master Billy Casper.

A total of 144 pros and 10 amateurs tee off in the first round over the 7,200-yard par 72 Tucson National Golf Club course. Tricky winds and undulating, fast greens averaging 11,000 square feet pose the biggest problems over the 72 hole tournament.

"There's going to be a lot of three-putting on those greens," said last week's Phoenix Open winner L. D. Peach of Spokane. "I'll take a super-putter like Casper to win this tournament."

With top 1964 money winners Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus absent, the 35-year-old Casper of San Diego remains among the favorites. He earned nearly \$100,000 as the No. 3 money winner on last year's professional golf association tour.

But if 1965 tournaments are any indication, some newcomers will charge out of the pack to pick up the \$46,000 first prize. No established pro golfer has yet been able to win two tournaments on this year's tour.

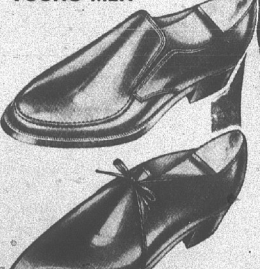
