

Dunsmuir Faces Claim For Airplane Damage

DUNSMUIR—A claim for \$11,000 has been filed by the International Aviation Underwriters against the City of Dunsmuir and its airport manager for damage to an airplane belonging to Larry More of Mount Shasta.

More's plane was damaged when the airport hangar collapsed from a load of heavy snow and the claim is based on alleged negligence on the part of the city and the airport manager. The city council referred the claim to its insurance agent at the council meeting.

Bids for a new airport hangar for which the city is seeking \$7,500 in disaster relief funds will be opened at the council meeting on Monday, March 1.

Bill Offers Tax Relief For Homes

SALEM (UPI)—Nonprofit, life-care retirement homes could be exempt from property taxation for the 1965-66 tax year and thereafter under a bill introduced by Sen. Al Fiegel, D-Roseburg.

Fiegel, Sens. Robert Ellstrom, R-Salem; Donald Husband, R-Eugene; and Glen Stadler, D-Eugene, and Reps. Dale Harlan, D-Milwaukie, and Wayne Turner, D-S. Helens, cosponsored the measure at the request of the Oregon Association of Retirement Services.

The bill (SB 363) would apply "as to a corporation, organized and operated, or preparing to self for operation, only for the purpose of furnishing permanent residential, recreational and social facilities primarily for elderly persons."

Legislative Action

SALEM (UPI)—The Senate Wednesday approved the following measures:

SB 66 — Enables judges to take one-year leave of absence.

SB 72 — Allows release from jail of indigent persons unable to pay fine after sentence has been served, or directing discharge of indigents if no sentence of imprisonment imposed.

SB 134 — Setting payroll contribution limit for department of employment at \$8,000 of wages.

SB 135 — Calling for annual renewal of \$20 commercial fishing boat license.

SB 157 — Allows courts to review issuance, or refusal to issue, licenses to carry a concealed weapon.

SB 165 — Requires courts to file copies of boundary dispute settlement decisions with county surveyor and county assessor.

The following were approved by the House:

HB 1003 — Pay raises for elected officials, department heads, state police and other unclassified employees.

HB 1023 — Broadens the authority of the state insurance commissioner and requires him to approve or disapprove both proposed insurance policies.

HB 1108 — Allows counties to establish bank, recreation, dilapidated and flood control districts.

HB 1288 — Exempts from state tax the inventory and government-owned tools in firms working on national defense contracts.

HB 1291 — Raises minimum wages of election board workers to \$1.25 an hour and \$3 a day.

HB 1382 — Raises annual license fee for podiatrists from \$15 to \$25.

HB 1392 — Increases fee for voters pamphlet page to candidate for local-prevention projects.

HB 1393 — Raises filing fee for delegate to national convention from \$15 to \$35.

HJM 8 — Memorializes Congress to authorize and provide funds for flood-prevention projects.

SB 23 — Outlaws driving the wrong way on a divided freeway and crossing the dividing except at designated openings.

—Is organized not for profit. Revenue not less than 50 percent of its operating income from payments for living, medical, recreational and social services and facilities paid on behalf of the elderly persons using the facilities.

—Permits no part of its net earnings to inure to the benefit of any private stockholder or individual.

—Guarantees to each resident "that he or she will never find it necessary to seek old-age assistance under public welfare."

Rosy Future Now Faces Death Row Prisoner

BELLEVUE (UPI)—Lafayette Zimmerman, native of New York's lower East Side, once stung in Sing Sing's death row, his bright future and death in the electric chair only 120 minutes away.

Today he begins a new job and a new life he hopes will wipe out the nightmare of 24 years spent in New York prisons including nine months in the death row.

In April of 1938 when he was 19, Zimmerman was found guilty of first degree murder in the slaying of a police officer at a New York City coffee shop.

With death two hours away, his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment. On Feb. 2, 1962, he was freed when the State Court of Appeals reversed the guilty verdict.

Free Man
"I became a free man technically at that time," says Zimmerman, now a graduate of 47. "But I wasn't really free. I couldn't get work.

"If I applied to about 50 firms in New York and all of them said I was a bad risk because of my record, I had more humanity, I was wrong."

Zimmerman wrote a book, "Punishment Without Crime," and appeared on television.

Gas Service Scheduled For Coast

PORTLAND (UPI)—A multi-million dollar transmission pipeline construction program to bring natural gas to the Oregon coast is scheduled to start this spring, the Northwest Natural Gas Co. said today.

The initial project, to cost \$2.8 million, will start March 1 and connect 61 miles of pipeline from just north of Deer Island to Astoria and Seaside.

The company said expansion would be a factor in future industrial growth of the lower Columbia River area.

El Paso Natural Gas Co., which supplies natural gas to Pacific Northwest, has applied for federal approval to build a 16-inch line under the Columbia River to a new gas station on Deer Island. It would be the fifth such Columbia River cross-pipeline to supply the local firm.

The initial coastal line is scheduled to serve the planned Shell chemical plant at St. Helens, Crown Zellerbach's new pulp mill at Waukena, the Job Corps center at Tongue Point and other industries, the firm said.

Northwest Natural also said that it hoped to complete preparations soon for construction of a pipeline to carry gas from Perrydale west to Newport. The date has been set for the start of construction. A branch of the line is scheduled for the Tillamook area sometime next year.

Truman Raps LBJ Critics

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman, in a rare public political comment, struck out at critics of President Johnson's policy in Viet Nam.

Truman aimed his barbs at "side-line hecklers who neither have all the facts nor all the answers."

The 80-year-old former President's remarks were in a two-page document handed to newsmen at his office. He did not appear in person.

Responsibility for the conduct of foreign policy is vested in the President and "information on that situation has to come from him," Truman noted.

"But this, by no means, puts a President above questioning or beyond criticism," Truman said, and President Johnson would be the first to affirm it.

"But the President is badly served at his task as President, by those irresponsible critics, or side-line hecklers who neither have all the facts nor the answers."

The former President said the Viet Nam operation had been a costly and needless job and that the patience of Americans had been sorely tried.

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Tax Cuts Aid Oregon Businesses, PUC Chief Tells Senate Committee

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon utilities were forced to use federal tax cuts to finance expansion and improvements of service, Public Utility Commissioner John Hill told the Senate Commerce and Utilities Committee today.

At the end of the session, Sen. Thomas Mahony, D-Portland, praised Hill "for putting into effect the President's goal of improved service and stimulate economic activity."

Hill said the 1964 corporate tax cut represented an \$75,000 saving to Oregon utilities. He said another 2 per cent federal tax reduction takes place this year.

to provide rate cuts for consumers, he said.

Willner at one point asked how the Oregon reaction compared to that in other states. Hill said some other states did nothing.

When Willner pressed about activities in neighboring states, Hill snapped, "I don't care what they do. I am absolutely right in what we did in Oregon. Our job is to look out for the Oregon people, and we are achieving the intent of the president's tax cut."

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
