

Second Place Owls Play Non-Counter

Oregon Tech, comfortably situated in second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference, has yet two opportunities to advance into the No. 1 spot, but is faced with the equally "uncomfortable" task of defeating Oregon College of Education to do so.

Despite the fact that Oregon College is in the cellar with a conference standing of 47 points (compared to the Owls' 8-6), they are a most formidable foe on their home court, and this is exactly where the Owls' final contests are played.

This weekend however, the Owls get a breather from conference play, but again, face a rugged opponent in Portland when they clash with Cascade College.

Whether or not the Owls can survive their two-game stand at Oregon College will depend upon the effectiveness of their four big scorers and upon the board work of their fifth starter, Hank Albrecht.

Rich Lyons is currently picking the Owl cagers with an average of 22.23 points per game, followed closely by Mike Werten with 19.51 points per contest. The next highest scorers on the squad are Will Robinson and LeVoy Young, with 11.92 points and 10.53 per game respectively.

Young added to his average with a 22-point output against Southern Oregon on Tuesday, and Robinson helped his with an 18-point effort.

Hank Albrecht has developed into a terror on the boards with recent games, and achieved an all-time high this season of 18 rebounds against Eastern Oregon last weekend.

Albrecht isn't counted upon to heavily score, but he's averaging 7.53 points per game.

Campus Ready For Meet

With seven conference games remaining, including those with Medford and Crater this weekend, the Klamath Union Pelicans are hard-pressed to find the necessary strength for a strong Southern Oregon Conference finish.

The Pelicans are at Medford tonight, and Crater comes Saturday night.

If hard work is the key to success, the Pelicans certainly have earned that success this week. Coach Al Keck has been turning the Pels every way but loose, and only the results of this weekend will tell whether the Pels profited by their extra heavy sessions.

The Pelicans have indicated by their last two performances that they have the "where-with-all" to win, first by scalping the Grants Pass Grovers and then by defeating the Pelicans at Pelican Court, then holding off a determined Ashland Grizzly line on their home court, but the big test comes this weekend.

Each weekend the Pelicans have the biggest test for the Pels, but with the Cavemen knocking over the Grizzlies last weekend, it's only fitting that the Pelicans do the same thing this weekend.

It's even more significant when we glance at the remaining contests.

First it's the Medford-Crater series, then comes a stiff contest with Grants Pass on their home court, followed by a series with Ashland and Medford at Pelican Court. Wrapping up the season, the Pels travel to Crater, and host Grants Pass, concluding conference action on March 13.

A win over Medford and Crater this weekend would give the Pels a conference record of 8-3, within reach of Medford which should win over Ashland Saturday night, and would give them a conference mark of 10-2.

A sweep of the final five contests of the season would give the Pels a smart 13-4 conference standing, compared to Medford's 13-3, purely hypothetical at this point, but well worth thinking about.

Thus it is obvious that the Pelicans must win both of these weekend outings to hope for a share in the conference title.

Should the Pels drop to Medford tonight, and win against them at home on March 6, Medford would do no less than tie for the championship, and most likely would win the title by one single game.

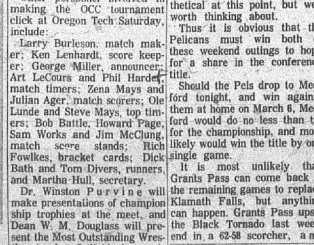
