

Choir Dates 1st Concert Of Series

The Klamath Union High School A Cappella Choir will present the first in a series of spring concerts Tuesday at Mills School Auditorium.

The a cappella choir will be assisted by the KUHS Symphony Orchestra and the Madrigal Singers in the concert, which will begin at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

All three groups are under the direction of M. Dale Halleck. Proceeds from Tuesday night's concert will finance a trip by the choir to the Oregon Education Association's annual meeting in Portland March 25-28. Mrs. Beulah Elliott, Altamont Junior High teacher, will be installed as OEA president at that meeting.

Admission to the concert is 50 cents and tickets are available from any choir or orchestra member, and at the door.

Featured on the concert program will be a presentation of Antonio Vivaldi's "Gloria," which will be sung in the original Latin. The orchestra will accompany this famous work, which was written at the turn of the 18th century. Soloists for "Gloria" will be selected from a group composed of Kathy Chalco, Judy Ward, Sandra Tuonoch, Stephanie Gudarian, all sopranos, and Julie Phillips, alto. In addition to the orchestra, Dennis Coleman, organist, will accompany.

Convocation Holds Last Of Sessions

NEW YORK (UPI)—Achieving of mutual interests and trust among nations headed discussion topics today in final sessions of a four-day symposium of world leaders of political and religious thought.

The convocation, exploring "requirements for peace," has been privately sponsored by the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions and has brought together an invited audience of nearly 2,000 from 11 countries.

The hope of the sponsors was that the intellectuals of the audience would return home and spark a continued dialogue reaching to "the man in the barber shop" about how to open ways to peace and cooperation.

A panel headed by Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., was scheduled to discuss "the terms of coexistence." Members included Lord Canning, British permanent representative to the United Nations; British historian Arnold Toynbee; Abba Eban, deputy prime minister of Israel, and Yevgeny Zhukov, history institute director of the U.S.S.R. Academy of Sciences.

In a late speech Friday, Pietro Nenni, deputy prime minister of Italy, put forward three fundamental conditions to political and economic unity of Europe.

Pope Issues Strong Plea For Peace

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI revealed Saturday he has "insistently" appealed to world leaders for a negotiated settlement of the Vietnamese war.

The pontiff said the crisis in Southeast Asia and other international difficulties had crossed his "grave concern."

It was the first time since World War II that a Pope disclosed he had used his high ecclesiastical office to attempt a settlement of a crucial world problem.

Pope Paul disclosed his diplomatic activity in general terms in a letter to the Catholic episcopate of Viet Nam. The letter was dated Feb. 15, the weekend the United States launched its retaliatory air raids on Communist North Viet Nam.

The letter was made public Saturday on orders from the pontiff himself. In it the pontiff revealed he has "confidentially" approached the leaders of various governments "to ask them insistently to contribute to an honorable and peaceful settlement of the different international difficulties that cannot fail to arouse our grave concern."

The Pope did not name the world leaders he has contacted. The crisis in Southeast Asia has involved the world's greatest powers including the United States, the Soviet Union and Red China.

County School Group Starts Work On \$4 Million Budget Proposal

The county school budget committee began work Saturday on the administration's proposed \$4 million budget for the 1964-65 fiscal year.

School district clerk and budget officer Jim Morley explained the 150-page proposed budget to the committee.

The proposed budget calls for total expenditures of \$4,000,000, of which \$200,000 is a school director William Ganong Jr., for an answer.

Ganong outlined the functions of the budget committee and said, "Our intent was to make recommendations to have some figure to start from."

The same point was raised earlier Saturday by director Paul Fairclough at a school board meeting. He said some budget committees were unhappy with the board's decision.

In line with this, the directors agreed to merely inform the budget committee about proposals, instead of recommending them.

LBJ Plans Paris Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson has told Gen. Charles de Gaulle's top diplomatic representative that he hopes to meet with the French president in Paris later this year if a mutually satisfactory time can be arranged.

The possibility of a Johnson-De Gaulle meeting was discussed briefly and in general terms during a White House meeting Friday between the U.S. President and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville who renewed the standing invitation.

The principal topic of the conference, however, was Viet Nam. Couve de Murville was given reliable sources to have gained the impression that Johnson is not yet entirely certain exactly how to handle the critical situation in Southeast Asia.

The President again made it clear that he is not willing to accept the proposal of De Gaulle and others for early international negotiations, which would include Red China, to seek a political solution of the Communist warfare against U.S.-supported South Viet Nam.

However, French sources said they believed Johnson was trying to maintain a "flexible" position and would be guided in his strategy by developments as they occur.

Couve de Murville, after two days of talks here with Johnson, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and other officials, was said to be gratified by the content of the exchanges and hopeful that some of the tension had been taken out of Franco-American relations.

Police said William K. Thomas was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital where the .22-caliber bullet was removed from his foot.

Officers said the accident occurred at 2 p.m. at the Thomas home, 4230 South Sixth.

They said Thomas was handling the 22-caliber rifle when he pulled the trigger and the bullet struck just above the ankle, penetrating four inches.

Rule Clears Clerk Query

SALEM (UPI)—When the press of traffic business requires the district court to establish a traffic court violations bureau, the court may appoint the clerk or deputy clerk of that court as a violations clerk, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Friday.

In reply to questions from the Klamath County district attorney, Thornton said the court may also appoint another public officer within the territorial jurisdiction of the court as a violations clerk.

However, Thornton said, persons other than such public officers may not be appointed as a violations clerk.
