The Los Angeles Lakers to day held on to their 5½ game lead over the St. Louis Hawks in the National Basketball Association's Western Division after blasting the Boston Celtics 129-114, Sunday night.
 The triple-threat combination of Jerry West, Gene Wiley and Elgin Baylor wrote the game's story as Los Angeles won its second win in eight games against the NBA Eastern Division leading Celtics.
 Wiley and Baylor controlled the boards while West lit up the scoreboard with 47 points.
 The ever-improving Wiley grabbed 13 rebounds in the first half and ended the game with a total of 17. Baylor pumped in 29 points for the Lakers.
 In other NBA action Sunday, Philadelphia edged Baltimore 109-104, and the St. Louis Hawks dumped Detroit 112-107.
 Philadelphia's victory over Baltimore was sparked by Al Bianchi's 15-foot jump shot with 37 seconds left in the game.
 The two squads played a hectic fourth quarter basket-trading duel in which the Bucks came from behind to tie the score eight times and go ahead three times.

Swede Wins American Net Crown
SALISBURY, Md. (UPI)— Swedish Davis Cupper Jan Eric Lundquist said today that his victory in the U. S. indoor tennis championships "was my best ever indoors."
 Lundquist added the U. S. indoor title to his collection Sunday when he upset top-ranked American star Dennis Ralston 6-4, 11-9, before a capacity crowd of 4,400 in the Wisconsin youth and civic center as well as a national television audience.
 "This is the best win I have ever scored indoors," said Lundquist. "Beating Ralston is actually bigger than beating Chuck McKinley—although Chuck is better known in Europe."
 Lundquist, who best McKinley last Friday, has now won the "big four" of indoor tennis—the French title in 1962 and 1963, the Scandinavian title in 1960 and 1963, the German title this year and the United States title Sunday.
 Following his loss in the singles, Ralston teamed with McKinley to defeat defending champions Manuel Santana and Jose Luis Arilla of Spain, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4, in the doubles.

BREMEN, Germany (UPI)—Olympic swimming champions Cathy Ferguson and Jed Graf aren't pleased—they're equally at home in Asian or European waters.
 Miss Ferguson of Burbank, Calif., who won the 200-meter women's backstroke title at Tokyo, last October, stroked to her second victory in the Bremen International Invitation meet Sunday by winning the 100-meter backstroke in 1:09.1.
 She also swam a leg on the winning 400-meter medley relay team that was clocked in 4:37.5. On Saturday Miss Ferguson captured the 200-meter backstroke.
 Grant of Verona, N.J., won the 200-meter backstroke, his Olympic specialty, in 2:14.3 for a double. He took the 100-meter backstroke Saturday.
 U.S. swimmers won five events Sunday in the second day of competition against swimmers from 11 other countries.

Bruins Fade, But Dump Oregon 7-6-64

 UCLA, a prey to second-half slumps all of a sudden, hits the road this weekend in a bid to move closer to its second straight A W U basketball crown and defense of the NCAA title.
 Leading the AAUW with a 9-0 mark and 29-2 for the year, the second-ranked Bruins play at Stanford and California Friday and Saturday. There could be trouble if the Bruins don't shake their post-intermission troubles. They had to battle to get over Oregon last Saturday, 74-64, after fading in the second half.
Bob Charles Captures Tucson Open
TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI)—Left-hander Bob Charles, who almost passed up the \$46,000 Tucson Open golf tournament because he was tired, started his postponed vacation today, more exhausted than ever but richer by the tournament championship and his \$6,800 first prize.
 The 28-year-old New Zealand, playing one of the finest tournaments of his career, made a near-runaway of the Tucson Open at the 7200-yard National Golf Club course. He wrapped up the title comfortably Sunday with a methodical, final round 70 for 21. He won by four strokes with his 17 under par total.
 Charles, of Christchurch, capturing his second title on the PGA tour to go with his 1963 British Open championship, led 17 or more to finish, the first player to accomplish this since Dick Sikes did it in the Sahara Invitational at Las Vegas last October. Charles' other U.S. tour victory was in the 1962 Houston Classic.
 "I'm looking forward to a rest this week," said the slender, sober-faced golfer. "That feeling all the way takes a lot out of you. I believe I must have lost eight to ten pounds this week. I put on a pair of slacks Sunday and they didn't even fit me. They looked baggy."
 The 62 Charles weighed in at 163 here and said, "I can't afford to lose too much."
 Al Geberger, who started the day at 206, five strokes behind Charles, vividly expressed his closing 49 for 25, collecting \$3,850, while Don January, two-time Tucson Open champion, rocketed into third place with a course record 63 for 276, winning \$3,850.
 Billy Casper jumped his total tour earnings for 1963 to \$21,284 with his \$2,600 fourth place check. He closed with a 67. But Charles jumped into first place on the official PGA money list with his total of \$11,727.50.

U.S. Dons, Holding a Fat 9-0 Record in the West Coast Athletic Conference, also is on the road as they seek to wrap up their third straight league crown and a drive toward the NCAA regionals. USP is at Santa Clara Tuesday and the University of the Pacific on Friday. Then St. Mary's checks out the USP gym for a Saturday game.

 Ollie Johnson scored 24 points, 15 in the second half, to pace USP to a 73-66 win over Santa Barbara. The six-foot, eight-inch center also grabbed 15 rebounds to help shake a Gaucha team which was only two points behind at the half.
 Beavers Held
 Southern California kept its AAUW title hopes aglow by thumping Oregon State 64-38, on the Sports Arena floor after UCLA had won the opener of a twin bill. The Beavers were held to the lowest output ever registered in the arena since its 1959 opening. Fine guidance by Troy's Johnnie restricted Jim Jarvis of the Beavers to 10 points.
 Jump shot by Tommy Tommermark with 10 seconds left gave Washington State a 59-58 win over Stanford as the Cougars completed a weekend sweep against the Indians and California. The Bears also won their game in the last minute of play when Charley Perkins cannot two free throws that set up a 65-64 decision against Washington.
 Pepperdine sprang a West Coast A.C. upset by dropping UOP, 69-64, and dominating the game throughout. Keith Swagerty of the Tigers, the nation's third best man along the boards, was held to eight rebounds.
