

Reds Rattle Rockets At Army Anniversary

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union today celebrated the fifth anniversary of its armed forces against a backdrop of anti-American rocket-rattling. "We make no secret of the fact we possess nuclear warheads of unsurpassed power which are in the possession of our rocket troops," Defense Minister Rodion Y. Malinovsky said in an article in the Communist party newspaper Pravda.

Malinovsky, in his order of the day, called for artillery salutes of 20 salvos in Moscow and the "hero cities" of Leningrad, Sevastopol and Odessa. Celebrations, parades and special concerts were scheduled throughout the country to mark the Soviet army's navy day.

It was the second day in a row that Malinovsky had boasted of Soviet strength while criticizing American policies.

Legislative Action

The following measures were approved by the House Monday:

HB 1041—Revises uninsured motorist law. States who is covered and under what conditions; provides for all-accident coverage, arbitration and payment offsets.

HB 1052—Makes possible refund of Oregon gasoline taxes to persons taxed for same fuel in both Oregon and Washington between Jan. 1, 1961, and Jan. 1, 1963.

HB 1176—Allows appropriation of waters of Crystal Springs creek and its tributaries at Portland.

HB 1176—Permits port bonds to be sold in denominations larger than \$1,000 and authorizes redemption in inverse numerical order.

HB 1267—Provides voters conduct last week of state elections may also vote on debt distribution plan.

HB 1437—Gives chief medical investigator of state authority equal to that of county or district investigators; provides chief investigator shall appoint county investigators with approval of county governing body.

Tax Group Proposes Face-Saver

SALEM (UPI)—A face-saving compromise that will forgive more than half the \$5 million tax liability due by out-of-state manufacturing corporations will be introduced in the House, Senate Tax Committee Chairman Ward Cook, D-Portland, revealed.

His announcement followed a special committee meeting Monday to probe the legislature's intent when it enacted in 1957 a law to allow manufacturing concerns to use their property taxes as a credit against their corporate income taxes.

A State Supreme Court decision last week nullified the offset for out-of-state firms. As a result 573 out-of-state manufacturing firms faced \$4.5 million in unpaid taxes, plus \$84,000 in interest.

Plan Detailed
Cook said the Tax Commission would draft a bill for introduction in the House which would:

—Forgive the taxes for the years 1957 through 1961.

—Outlaw any penalty payments for the period the taxes were not paid.

—Extend the tax advantage to out-of-state manufacturing concerns beginning this year.

—Leave it up to the Tax Commission to decide whether to bill the firms for the interest involved during the time the taxes were not paid.

The compromise plan will add about 15 million to the state's coffers, but will forgive about \$3.5 million of the liability.

Cook said Gov. Mark Hatfield "agrees with this procedure."

At Monday's special hearing, two former state senators who were members of the Senate Tax Committee which drafted the 1957 law said they thought that the exemption was intended for out-of-state firms.

Not Much Attention
But both former Sen. Rudy Wilhelm and Lee Omat, said this point didn't get much attention.

Sen. Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, who also was a member of that 1957 tax committee, said he thought the law was drafted to give the advantage to firms that had manufacturing plants in Oregon.

Musa, however, was critical of the fact that the firms that had been allowed the tax offset for the past eight years were faced with having to pay the full amount.

He noted there is a three-year cutoff date on the liability for other forms of taxation.

Tax Commission Chief Counsel Carlisle Roberts admitted that the Supreme Court decision "was something of a surprise."

"The high court said the tax advantage was only for Oregon manufacturing firms. Since 1957 the tax commission has offered the advantage to all manufacturing firms, regardless of whether they had plants in Oregon."

House Committee Passes Fish, Game Merger

SALEM (UPI)—A bill merging the State Fish and Game Commissions was approved by the House Fish and Game Committee Monday and sent to the floor.

The heavily-amended measure came out on a 6-3 vote, but 10 spokesmen for sportsmen's groups indicated they weren't quite ready to approve it.

The amendments include provisions for two assistant directors under a state director of fish and game. One of the assistants would be responsible primarily for administration of regulations which fall under the present State Game Commission and the other for those which fall under the Fish Commission.

"You're still going to have two commissions," insisted Rep. Wally Priestley, D-Portland, who called the amendments "a hoax."

Priestley opposed sending the bill to the floor, as did Reps. J. E. Bennett, D-Portland, and Irving Mann Jr., R-Stanfield. W. S. Oudekerk, R-Newport; L. B. Day, D-Salem, and William G. Hughes, R-Portland, supported the bill.

Elder, the committee chairman, disagreed with Priestley's charge. "The main purpose is to try to curb inter-agency fighting over anadromous fish," he said.


