## Michigan Remains On Top

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Michigan Wolverines maintained their first place standing in the weekly United Press International college basketball ratings today, but one coach blames them for being envious of second-ranked UCLA.

The Wolverines must tackle Minnesota, the fastest rising team in the ratings tonight at Minneapolis where the Gophers have been invincible this season. The Gophers, who ranked as high as third early in the season, returned to the top 10 in seventh place after a two-month absence. Two weeks ago they ranked only 18th.

Saturday, Michigan must journey to Illinois where the 18th ranked Illini are unbeaten. Meanwhile, UCLA visits Stanford (12-7) and California (18-1) this weekend. Neither team is ranked and both fell easily to the Bruins earlier this season. The first six teams — Michigan, UCLA, St. Joseph's (Pa.), Providence, Duke and Davidson, in order — held their positions from the previous week as did eighth-ranked Vanderbilt and ninth-ranked Indiana.

Michigan dropped from seventh to 10th and bumped Tennessee from 10th to 12th. Michigan gained 25 first place votes from the 35 other teams on the UPI rating board, the other nine being distributed among UCLA (6), St. Joseph's (2) and Providence (1).

San Francisco climbed back into 11th place, Tennessee fell to 13th and 18th-ranked Illinois changed places with 14th-ranked New Mexico. Brigham Young remains in a tie with 15th-ranked St. Joseph's (Mo.) and 16th-ranked Michigan (Fla.) advanced two notches to 17th. Villanova, Oklahoma State and Kansas were demoted for 18th.

The ratings cover games played through Saturday, Feb. 20.
