School Unit Votes 'No!' On Measure

Klamath Falls elementary school directors took a flat negative stand on the proposed school unification bill Wednesday afternoon with a strongly-worded statement to the Senate Education Committee. The statement, which is scheduled to be approved by Klamath Union High School directors Thursday evening, tells the committee that "Reorganization without provision for county tax equalization is not acceptable to these two boards." Directors of both boards agreed to the negative stand on the bill informally Monday night. The bill, now before the Senate Education Committee, would convert Klamath Union High School district into a unified school district with responsibility for educating students in grades 1-12. The bill as now written has no provision for county tax equalization which school officials say would lessen the financial effect on Klamath County.

Statement Released

"Although the boards recognize that legislation of this type may be the only way that the three districts of this county may ever achieve one through 12 organization," the statement says, "they are aware that this bill as presented removes the present de facto county property tax equalization now in effect by our overlapping districts without allowing us the opportunity to take this matter to the Intermediate School District Law, which effects tax equalization, is barred in counties with county school districts, such as Klamath. The unification bill makes no provision either for eliminating the county tax equalization law in counties with county units."

"Only Klamath and Josephine counties may not achieve county equalization in this manner," the statement says. "The two boards feel that this county is entitled to the benefits of county equalization in the same manner as the other 34 counties of the state where county equalization is in effect." The statement adopted by the board is a slight modification of a statement written by Superintendent of Schools Ray Hiammer. It will be forwarded to Sen. Al Filgate, D-Roseburg, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and principal author of the unification bill. The committee is scheduled to vote on the bill March 1. The county school district board of directors has taken no stand on the bill.

Log Honors 'Sea' Road

A log 12 feet in diameter is being honored by Crescent City, Calif., in recognition of the city's participation in the construction of the Winnemucca-to-Eagle Highway, which has its terminal points at those two cities, the Klamath County Board of Commissioners announced Wednesday. Commissioner Frank Ganong said the giant log will be trucked through this city about Friday. It is believed that the Nevada city will place the log on display as a monument celebrating the completion of the new highway. The last 16-mile link in the 500-mile long route to the Pacific was dedicated near the city of the Woods last October. Other improvements are still underway south of Eagle Point and consist of the construction of a bypass and the laying of a new section of road.

Chamber Backs OTI 'Come-See' Plan For Oregon High School Counselors

High school counselors throughout the state will receive invitations to four Oregon Technical Institute within the next 30 days in order that they may learn of the exceptional educational opportunities offered at the college. The program to disseminate the role of the institute as one of the leading technical colleges in the West was announced by Vern Owens, local businessman, to the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce during its regular business meeting at the Winema Motor Hotel Wednesday. Advantages Stressed. Owens remarked that too few educators in the state are fully aware of the valuable technical training offered at the institute. Stressing the need of creating the advantages of such training to instructors who could pass that message along to their students, Owens stated that a one-day tour would be held on campus within the next month in which counselors from statewide prep schools would be invited. The idea was initially advanced by Dr. Winston Purvine, president of the college, who has been arranging such tours of the college since it opened last fall; however, those tours have been conducted on a much smaller scale, Owens said. In extending its support to the come-and-see program, the chamber agreed to allocate more than \$1,000 to defray some of the costs of the special program. Brooks Dickerman, president of the chamber, observed that such a sight-seeing program would result in gaining the institute its rightful recognition as one of the leading "technological colleges in the world." He cited that renewed and energetic efforts in disseminating facts about OTI to potential college students in the state would achieve a much larger enrollment at the institute. Jury Boosts Land Price

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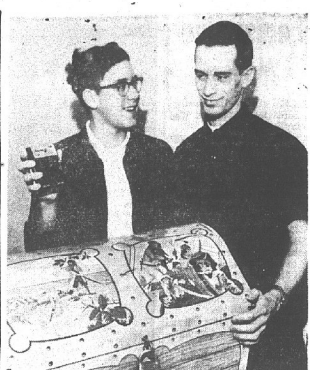
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Bush Firm Purchases Store Site
