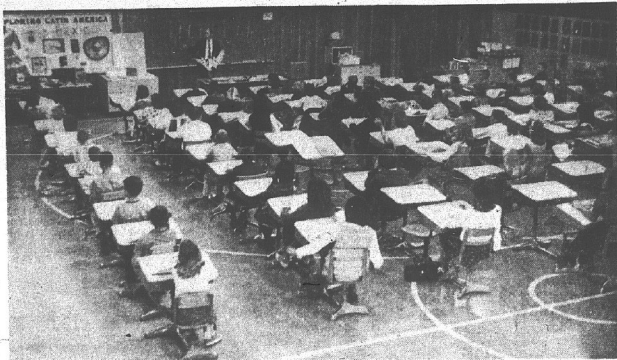

Team Teach Plan Tried At Ferguson

An experiment in team teaching caused by a classroom shortage at Ferguson School has led to the permanent installation of this technique at Ferguson.

Last year, 80 sixth graders at Ferguson were housed in the school's gymnasium because of the classroom shortage.

County school officials used this situation to conduct the experiment in team teaching.

Three teachers and a teacher's aide operated the team teaching experiment.

The group was instructed as a whole. Each teacher was a specialist in a particular field and each teacher instructed the class in his field. This utilized the strengths of each teacher.

In addition to the mass instruction, the group sometimes was divided into smaller groups for more individualized instruction.

When a four-room addition was completed late in 1964, Ferguson principal Clayton Sharpe and Mrs. Isabelle Brinker, county schools supervisor of elementary education, worked parts of the team teaching experiment into a new program.

The 80 students are divided into three rooms.

But the strengths of each teacher are utilized as each class moves from room to room for instruction in particular subjects. Occasionally, all 80 students are gathered together for instruction.

The subjects being taught by the team method include science, mathematics, social studies and language arts.

The arrangement is similar to that each sixth grade student will encounter in junior high and high school.

Mrs. Brinker said the new concept seems to be working well.

Team teaching may be attempted at other schools in the county system.

LOG CABIN SCHOOL

One of the earliest schools in Klamath County was located at Bly. There are records of a school in that community as early as 1883, located in a log cabin. In 1897, there were three students attending the school during the summer. Today, there is a new elementary school and a high school.

COS Campus Facilities Expanded

WEED, Calif.—College of the Siskiyous is rapidly expanding its facilities to keep pace with continually increasing enrollments.

Construction was completed recently on a \$400,000 gymnasium seating 1,000 spectators.

Bids have been called for construction of a 72-student dormitory expected to cost about \$250,000.

And plans are being drawn for an auto shop.

Reading architect Allyn Martin has designed the new buildings.

FIRST SCHOOL

The first school in Klamath Falls was established in 1870, when the community was still called Linkville. A three-month school was established over Roberts Store at Payne Alley and Main Street.

The new dormitory will be a two-story—boys on the bottom floor and girls above them.

The new dormitory is expected to be completed in time for the opening of the fall term. The auto-shop also is expected to be completed by the fall term.

College of the Siskiyous is moving ahead educationally as well as physically.

The college governing board has approved a number of new courses for next fall, all of which still must be approved by the State Department of Education.

The new courses include special advanced programs in foreign languages, bookkeeping, business machines, physical science, life science and physical education.

HOME IN SCHOOL

The former school of the no longer existent community of Gale, near Merrill, is now a home. With Gale's consolidation of Merrill, the former school building was remodeled into a home and is used for that purpose today.



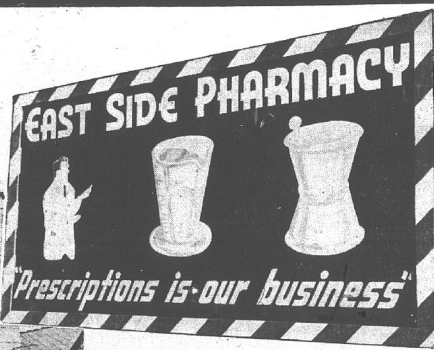
