The loons on Klamath Lake were chilled, and had ceased to call, for ice rimmed the shores and the moon looked cold and pale on Dec. 11, 1947, when an Indian child, a girl, was born in Klamath Valley Hospital.

To her family and her friends, she is Ferol Jean Jackson of Klamath Falls, the great-granddaughter of Mrs. Anna May Copperfield and great-granddaughter of Winema, whose name has been printed and reprinted for her part in the last Indian war waged in Southern Oregon. She is named for her maternal great-grandmother, Mrs. Ferol Matt, now living in Montana.

Ferol is of Klamath and Modoc ancestry, a junior at Klamath Union High School, where she likes history. She plans to go on to college, probably the University of Oregon.

Her "big" love is animals, any animal. She has a mare, Py-wak-et, meaning witch, and a cat, plus a dog, "just dog," called Tipper.

She especially likes to sing and will appear on KOTI-TV in Indian costume before the day when one of the five pretty Indian girl contestants will be named queen of the 1965 All-Indian World Championship Basketball Tournament at Chiloquin, in April.

Ferol, as a sophomore, attended St. Mary's of the Valley Academy at Beaverton, was a member of the Wranglers 4-H Horse Club in Klamath Falls, "when I was younger," and she just could make up her mind to be a veterinarian.
