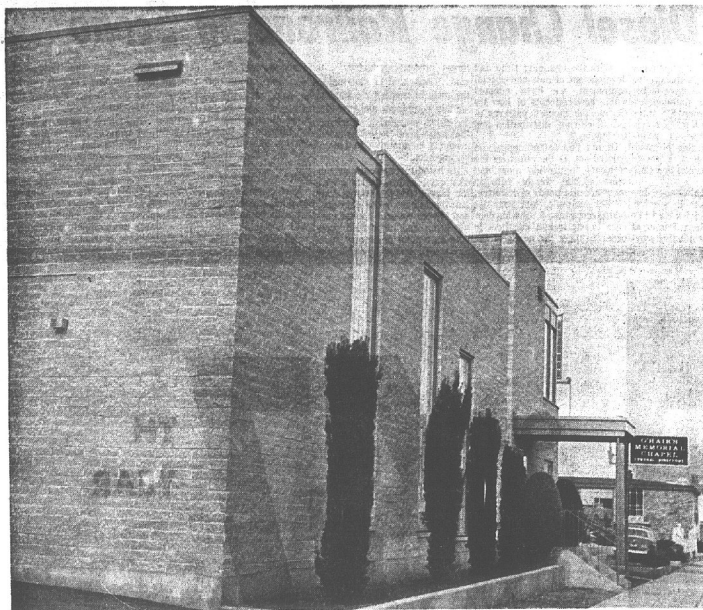


New Buildings Constructed



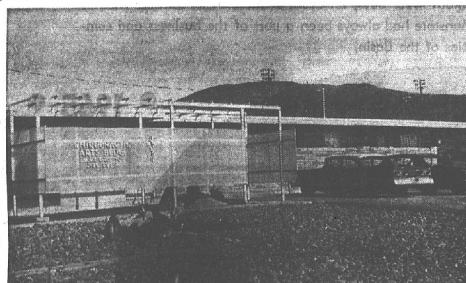
NEW CHAPEL COMPLETED — The most imposing new structure along Pine Street during 1964 was O'Hair's Memorial Chapel which was completed about Sept. 1, providing the very latest in mortuary quarters in the area. The old chapel building is now being torn down to make room for additional parking space.

Representatives of the Order of the Golden Rule, with which O'Hair's is affiliated, from Springfield, Ill., were here for the grand opening. Built by Duncan Construction Company, it includes chapel, slumber rooms, two offices, two upstairs apartments and other rooms.



SPARKLING NEW BUILDING — Moly and Van Dyke, Inc., automotive and industrial parts and supplies, added a modern note to the block bounded by Klamath, Walnut, Sixth and Seventh streets during 1964. They added this modernistic new structure on Klamath, new parking facilities on Seventh where two old

structures were torn down, and a new machine shop building over on Sixth Street, known as Moly and Fletcher Company, consisting of Gilbert and Norm Moly, Klamath Falls; George Moly, Redding, and Fred Fletcher, foreman and head machinist in Klamath Falls.



TO NEW QUARTERS — Dr. Robert E. Garrison, chiropractic physician held open house in his new building at 2236 South Sixth Street on Aug. 9, 1964. Norman Jones, Klamath Falls, was contractor for the one-story structure.



RISES FROM RUINS — A new restaurant, Topper's Steak House, has risen from the burned ruins of the former Suburban Drug Store in the Town and Country Shopping Center. It is only one of many new structures being built in the shopping center.



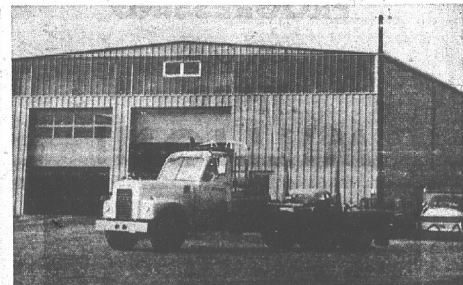
ONE OF TWO — This new Shell Oil Company station at 135 Main Street was one of two Shell operations completely reconstructed during 1964. This station is operated by R. G. "Whitney" Torgerson and maintained complete operation while the old building was torn down and the new one put up.



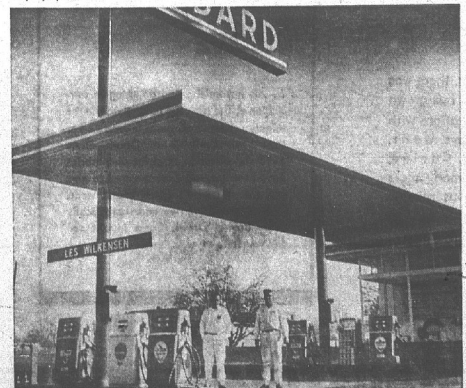
PLANT EXPANDED — Carlson's Furniture, 2405 South Sixth Street, completed remodeling its quarters in 1964, providing spacious new room for its retail furniture outlet and upholstery operation. The remodeling effort took place over a four-year period and completely revamped the firm's building. Latest addition provided 108 feet of window display space.



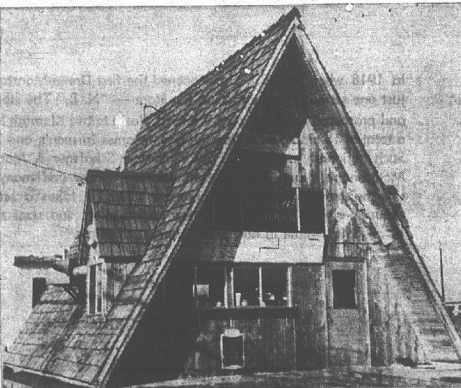
HOME OF CHEVROLET — This new complex at 677 South Seventh Street is the home of Dugan and Mast Chevrolet Company. The new addition at left was recently completed and a grand opening for the facilities held in January. Dugan and Mast moved to remodeled quarters on Seventh Street in September, and Eldon Alt, contractor, constructed the new spacious addition for service facilities.



BUSY SPOT — This metal repair shop with 60 by 120 square feet of floor space, located on the Greensprings Highway, completed last fall, is headquarters for heavy equipment repair for the Bly Logging Co., and for truck repairs for Henderson and Henderson, log haulers for Bly Logging. Seven or eight men are employed during the winter on repair jobs, more in the summer when log hauls increase.



NEW STANDARD STATION — Les Wilkenson is the operator of this new Standard Service Station constructed at the corner of South Sixth and Wlad streets. The new station was open for business on Jan. 19, 1965. Wilkenson is shown here at right, with his assistants, Vern Cochran.



NEW DRIVE-IN — Steel O'Connell, Klamath Falls businessman, completed this new A-frame drive-in building at the junction of Shasta Way and Alameda. The building is 24 feet long and uses a 30-degree pitch roof of two-inch planks and hand split shakes.



NEW SHELL STATION — This new ranch style Shell station, typical of the new design adopted by the Shell Oil Company, was constructed at South Sixth and Homedale Road and opened May 1. Manager of the station is Charles Cox.
