Air Base Adds \$10.9 Million To Area

KINGSLEY FIELD — Kingsley Field contributed more than \$10.9 million to the economy of Klamath County during 1964 — a \$2.4 million increase over the \$8.5 million contribution to the economy during 1963. Three-fourths of this year's estimate was the direct result of military and civilian payrolls. The military payroll during 1964 amounted to \$6,474,900 while the civilian payroll was \$1,235,366.

Contracts issued to local firms by the procurement office during the year amounted to approximately \$12 million, of which \$178,063 was for construction projects.

In addition, \$437,821 in contracts were awarded by the U.S. Navy Construction Office for work at Kingsley Field and Keno Air Force Station. The U.S. Navy is responsible for all major construction projects at Kingsley Field.

Commercial loans to base personnel during 1964 amounted to \$658,062.

Monies spent through non-appropriated funds for salaries and supplies during 1964 amounted to \$267,901. Kingsley agencies using non-appropriated funds include the Officers' Club, the Non-Commissioned Officers' Club, the central accounting office, and the Central Base Fund.

An estimated \$250,000 was given to local hospitals, physicians and supporting medical services for medical care provided active duty and retired personnel and their dependents.

Monies paid during 1964 for packing, crating, storage and movement of household goods within the local area, shipment of goods by freight, passenger tickets and delivery of coal amounted to \$331,942.

School and money received from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for 1964 for education of dependents of federal personnel, most of whom are from Kingsley Field, totaled \$160,000.

Of the \$11.9 million contributed to the economy of Klamath County, \$624,814 was paid to local construction companies for work at Kingsley Field and Keno Air Force Station. The majority of the construction contracts were awarded by the Navy Construction Office and the base procurement office.

O. I. Hall of Seattle built a fallout shelter for the operations center at Kingsley Field at a cost of \$319,587. Though the construction company was from out-of-state,

most of the men and supplies used for the project were from the local area, according to the U.S. Navy Construction Office.

An aircraft wash rack was built by the Patterson Construction Company at a cost of \$84,750.

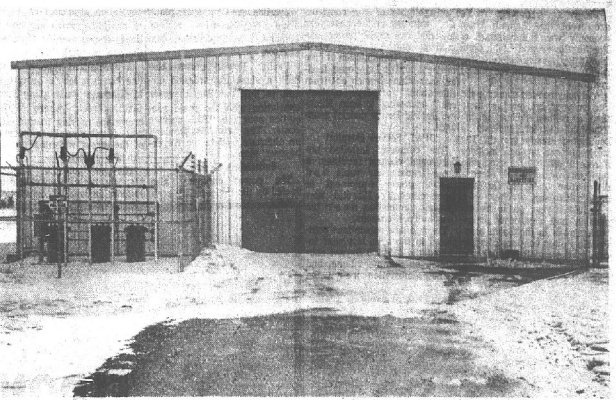
A contract for \$63,744 was awarded to E. N. Alt for the electrification of the aircraft hangar to increase capabilities for installing equipment that required large voltages.

E. N. Alt also installed a weather transmissometer and a ceilometer for the weather detachment at Kingsley Field at a cost of \$19,237. The weather instruments are used to determine visibility and ceiling for Kingsley-based aircraft.

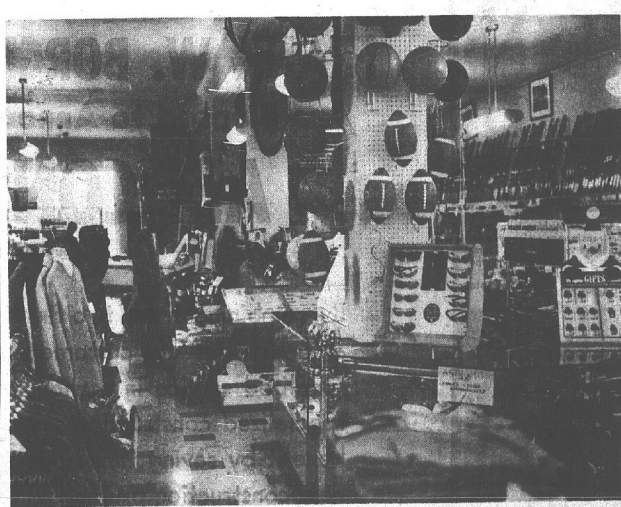
Friesen - Welman Company replaced water heaters at the military housing area at a cost of \$26,072.

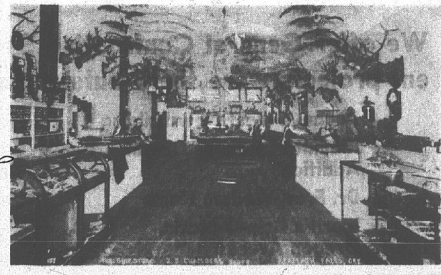
