

Lakeview Voters Okay Bond Issue For Paving

LAKEVIEW — Two Lakeview policemen resigned in May and Jack Fairchild was appointed by the town council as chief of police.

Forty four fire calls were answered by the Lakeview Volunteer Fire Department in 1964, 12 of which were outside the city. There were 19 grass fires, 14 in dwellings, and others in miscellaneous categories, amounted to \$92,000 for fires.

The largest fire occurred in May when Belinski Motors Lakeview Glass and Body Shop, and A. E. Rung Jewelry Repair Shop were all destroyed in one conflagration.

In a close contest during the May 15 election the Lakeview street bond issue was approved. It involved the council's proposal to issue \$500,000 in general obligation bonds to complete the town paving.

In July the town garbage hauling franchise was transferred to Christensen Brothers Sanitation Service of Burns. Transfer was made as of Aug. 1.

In was announced in August by Congressman Al Ullman that the Housing and Home Finance Agency had approved a \$1,250 public works planning advance for engineering studies, investigation, cost estimates, and a report on the construction of a new sanitary sewer system by the Lakeview Suburban Sanitary District. The estimated cost of the project was \$207,550 and construction was expected to start in May of 1965.

A field engineering office to survey a segment of the Pacific Northwest - Southwest power intertie system, was opened in Lakeview early in September by E. H. Schmidt and Associates, Inc., of Tulsa, Okla.

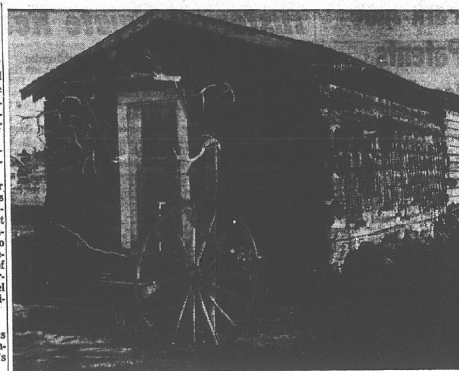
Receipts Rise At Lakeview

LAKEVIEW — The Lakeview post office showed total postal receipts of \$72,754.11 for the calendar year of 1964, as compared with \$69,793.17, according to a report by Postmaster Orval R. Layton.

The increase could be partially credited to the raise in parcel post rates, Layton said.

Christmas stamp sales for December totaled \$3,417.44 as against \$2,731.97 for the previous year. Incoming parcel post was 253 pieces less for December but this was attributed to the fact that flood conditions delayed until Jan. 7 the arrival of a considerable amount of parcel post. The outgoing parcel post for the period was heavier by 112 sacks.

BONANZA — Each August a benefit carnival is held for the improvement and upkeep of Bonanza Big Springs Park, since the park is not on the tax roll.

FLB Tells Loan Use

ALTURA — Roger Collis manager of the Federal Land Bank Association in Alturas reports that in 1964 \$2,057,732 in land bank loans were made to ranchers and farmers in Modoc, Lassen, Plumas and Sierra counties, and also to that part of Siskiyou County in the Tulelake area.

He said that loans outstanding in the association at the end of 1964 amounted to \$6,344,172.58, an increase of \$1,649,018.87 over amounts outstanding at the end of 1963.

Collis said that indications show the ranchers and farmers are using an increased amount of credit to meet a capital needs. He continued that the capital requirements of farmers continue to increase for the purchase of additional lands, equipment, and improvements, as well as operating needs. He expressed the opinion that the demand for farm credit will again be high in 1965.

Collis has been manager of the Alturas association for several years and took over the added responsibilities of the Susanville office when it merged with the Alturas office July 1, 1965.
