

Lakeview Proud As Local Girl Reaches Ski Fame

LAKEVIEW — Lakeview's pride was very much evident in the accomplishments of a local girl, Jean Saubert, as she captured world skiing honors in the Olympics at Innsbruck, Austria.

On Feb. 1 of 1964 the promotion and transfer of Harold G. Baughman, Lakeview district manager for the Pacific Power and Light Company, was effective and his place was taken here by Robert H. Love.

For the third consecutive year Leslie Shaw, editor of the Lake County Examiner, was named first place winner in the annual newspaper writing awards given by the Sierra Cascade Logging Conference. It included a plaque and a check for \$150.

In February, T. R. Conn, Lakeview attorney, accepted appointment to the State Advisory Council for Oregon Technical Institute for the period ending June 30, 1965.

Ben Hazeltine, manager of the Sheldon-Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge, received an award of \$200, and Oscar V. Deming, biologist for the Department of the Interior's incentive awards committee for outstanding contributions to their fields of work.

In April, James C. Lynch became associated with T. R. Conn in law practice here. A native of 1963 and 12 members of the Lakeview Volunteer Fire Department were presented service pins for from five to 30 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hannan of Lakeview celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on Saturday, July 4. Except for a short time in California they have spent these years in the county. They are the parents of nine children, eight of whom survive, as well as 19 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Circuit Judge Charles H. Foster was one of 31 judges from 17 states invited to take part in National Institute by the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges. The institute was held at the University of Colorado law school.

George D. Lea was promoted in July to a staff job in Washington, D.C., from his position here as manager of the Bureau of Land Management's Lakeview District. His successor here was Max Bruce.

During their 29th annual convention at Hart Mountain the members of the Order of the Antelope chose Tom J. Flynn, Lakeview insurance man, as Chief Whitehall for coming year.

Partners Lease Spud Plant

Barney Muma, Sacramento, and Paul Fiorovich of Watsonville, Calif., are now operators of the Merrill Produce Co., potato packing and shipping operation in Merrill.

The plant is affiliated with the main packaging and distribution center of the Central California Packing Co., at Sacramento, which also has packing plant operations at Arcadia, Idaho, and Bakersfield, Calif.

Muma now has a crew of 34 persons in Merrill. He has pinpointed 1964 as "the best spud year for growers since 1919."

Present expectations are that the Merrill plant will run until May 1, when Muma will leave for Bakersfield, to package the crop of White Rose potatoes.

Mrs. Muma, an employee of the State of California at Sacramento, commutes to Merrill on weekends to assist in the office.

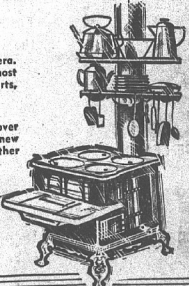

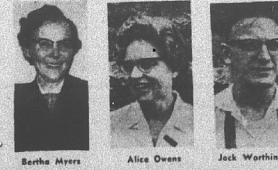
