Best-of-seven playoff series begins Wednesday with Vancouver at Portland and Victoria at Seattle.

The regular season of the Western Hockey League ended Sunday night when what amounted to a warmup for the four teams which will tangle in the playoffs.

And the results ran true to form, as that Portland team downed second place Seattle, 5-4, and third place Vancouver trimmed fourth place Victoria, 7-2.

Defending champion San Francisco and last place Los Angeles, who failed to make the playoffs, ended their seasons Saturday night against each other. The Seals defeated the Blades, 6-2, but finished two points behind the Blazers in the wire battle for a playoff berth.

Portland made it eight straight over Seattle when Gerry Goyer banged in a goal midway in the third period Sunday. The Bucs also beat the Totems Saturday, 4-2.

Victoria hoped to at least tie Vancouver for third place, and made a try by downing the Canucks, 5-3, Saturday. But the Maple Leafs had to settle for fourth, when Vancouver rebounded Sunday with the help of a hat trick by defenseman Ron Matthews. He scored once in each period.

Meanwhile league president Al Leader announced dates for the first four games of the semi-final playoffs, which sends Portland against Vancouver and Seattle against Victoria in best-of-seven rounds.

The schedule includes: March 31—Vancouver at Portland, Victoria at Seattle. April 2—Portland at Vancouver, Victoria at Seattle. April 3—Seattle at Victoria. April 4—Vancouver at Portland.

April 6—Portland at Vancouver, Seattle at Victoria. If more than four games become necessary in the Seattle-Victoria playoffs, the fifth game will be held at Seattle April 7, the sixth at Victoria April 10 and the seventh at Seattle April 11.
