

It Wasn't Drive To Open Streams Commercially Started

SAIGON (UPI)—The bombing of the U.S. Embassy today was the beginning of a series of attacks against American installations in South Viet Nam.

Following a brief roundup of other major bombings:

Feb. 9, 1964: Two bombs exploded under the bleachers of a U.S. servicemen's softball park in Saigon. Two American soldiers killed and more than 20 other Americans wounded.

Feb. 16, 1964: A bomb exploded in the lobby of a movie theater in Saigon's American community. Three U. S. soldiers killed. Fifty Americans and Vietnamese wounded.

May 2, 1964: Communist saboteurs sank the U.S. Navy escort aircraft carrier Card in Saigon Harbor with a bomb placed below the waterline.

May 3, 1964: Eight American servicemen watching salvage operations for the Card were wounded when a terrorist threw a hand grenade into their midst.

Nov. 1, 1964: A Viet Cong raiding party bombarded the U.S. helicopter base near Saigon with mortar. Four Americans killed and 72 wounded.

Dec. 24, 1964: Two Americans killed and 63 others wounded when a bomb exploded at the Brink Hotel in Saigon.

Feb. 17, 1965: Communist guerrillas killed eight American soldiers and wounded 10 in an attack on U.S. helicopter base at Pleiku, 240 miles northeast of Saigon.

Feb. 10, 1965: Communist suicide squads bombed U.S. Army enlisted men's billet at Qui Nhon, 275 miles northeast of Saigon. Twenty-three Americans killed and 22 wounded.

'Early Bird' Coalition Working To Enlarge Vote Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Early bird civil rights labor union coalition worked today to broaden the support of President Johnson's proposed voting rights bill.

Joseph L. Rauh Jr., counsel for the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, planned to distribute members of the House and Senate a series of proposed amendments to the measure. These were aimed principally at penalizing anyone intimidating Negroes seeking to vote.

The proposals were approved Monday at a workshop conference of leading Negro organizations and labor groups, sponsored by the International Union of Electrical Workers, AFL-CIO.

A house judiciary subcommittee continued hearings on the bipartisan administration measure today with South Carolina Atty. Gen. Daniel R. McLeod scheduled to testify.

The Senate Judiciary Committee also scheduled hearings with southern witnesses on tap. Southerners testified against the bill during hearings Monday. They criticized particularly the section which assumes discrimination against potential Negro voters in any state where less than 50 per cent of the state's eligible population registered or voted last November.

Red Cross workers positioned themselves at potential flooding points along rivers in the Upper Mississippi Basin for their annual "disaster watch."

Jackson, Miss., reported more than an inch of rain today, and other southern cities were drenched Monday. Monroe, La., Texarkana, Ark., and other cities reported heavy rainfall from 1 to 2 inches.

The surprise snowstorm Monday dumped at least seven inches of snow on parts of New England and caused two weather-related deaths before blowing out to sea.

Bartleboro, Vt., Haverhill, Mass., and Bennington, Vt., each reported 6 to 7 inch snows. Ski areas reported excellent snow conditions on the slopes.

Ways And Means Sends Hillcrest Budget Back

SALEM (UPI)—The Ways and Means committee gave up temporarily Monday in its efforts to pass a \$3.69-billion budget for fiscal 1966.

Other Budgets OK'd
 The \$3,629,589 budget of the public utility commissioner and a \$74.623 budget for the State Board of Barber Examiners also were approved and sent to the House for action. A bill increasing barbers' license fees was approved and sent to the Senate.

Three subcommittees also made some major decisions on fiscal matters.

A State Highway Department budget of \$284 million, \$29.5 million below Gov. Mark Hatfield's original recommendation, won tentative approval.

The budget also includes an additional \$6 million for state highway construction and \$300,000 for construction of marine parks.

Another subcommittee voted to increase drivers' licenses from \$2.50 to \$2.75, with the additional money going into the state's uninsured motorist fund.

Legislators studying the Welfare Commission budget voted to increase monthly housing allowances for welfare recipients and foster home payments \$5 a month, raise burial rates from \$110 to \$140 and increase the amount of money available for emergency care for children.

M-F Merger Under Study
 PORTLAND (UPI)—Stockholders of Meier & Frank today were studying a proposed merger into the big May Co. department store firm of St. Louis.

Boards of directors of the two firms approved a merger in meetings Monday.

The merger calls for exchange of one common share of Meier & Frank stock for one share of a new May Co. preferred stock, estimated by Jack L. Meier, president of the Portland firm, to be "in excess of \$50 per share."

The proposal must be approved by two-thirds majority of the stockholders of each company. No date was set for stockholders to vote.

Attending the board meeting here were Aaron Frank, former president, and his son, Gerry, who recently resigned as manager of the Salem store of Meier & Frank. Sale of stock to Broadway-Hale Inc. of Los Angeles.

Ebue Rosenbergs, a director and general counsel, said approximately 50 per cent of the company stock is pledged to the May Co. offer, leaving about 12 per cent to be acquired to assure the merger with May.
