## Brookings Grid Coach Accepts Pelican Post

William E. Willard, coach of the highly-successful A-2 Brookings-Harbor Bruins for the past two years, Monday night was named to succeed Bob Williams as head football coach at Klamath Union High.

The Klamath Union High Board of Directors chose Willard from dozens of candidates for the position.

The 31-year-old new Pelican mentor holds both bachelor and master degrees from the University of Oregon and is a Phi Beta Kappa.

Prior to taking over at Brookings-Harbor High School in 1963, Willard taught three years at Monroe, Ore., Klamath School.

Willard was recommended for the position by both Superintendent of Schools Ray Hunsaker and KUHS Principal C. E. Cleveland.

During his two-year tenure at Brookings, the Bruins won the district A-2 championship both years and were rated as high as second in the Journal and Oregon polls both years.

Willard was named Coach of the Year for the state in 1963. Completion of the 1964 season gave the Bruins a 22-1 record in the past 23 games.

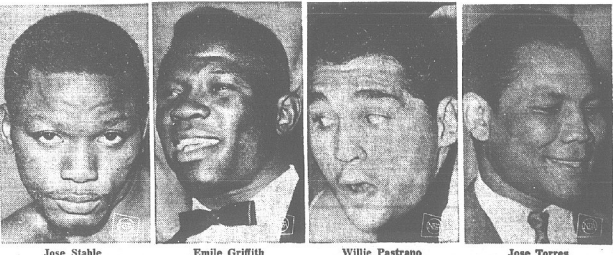
Williams has been moved from the coaching slot to a position as assistant principal at KUHS.

## Card Tabbed 'Rebirth' Of Boxing

NEW YORK (UPI)—Another chapter in the story of boxing's amazing rebirth in New York will be written tonight when Jose Stable (pro) and Emilio Griffith, Oriente Province, Griffith, native of the Virgin Islands, is favored at 15-5.

Immediately thereafter, light-heavyweight king Willie Pastrano of New Orleans and Miami Beach will meet Jose Torres, Emilio Griffith will defend his world welterweight title against Stable (pro) in another scheduled 15-round bout. The betting odds are much shorter on this one, Pastrano being favored by 13-10.

All four combatants checked into New York from their training camps late Monday and will weigh in at official ceremonies in the Garden lobby at 11:30 a.m. today.

Boxing's resurgence in New York was launched Feb. 1 at the Garden when a standing-room-only crowd of 12,100 paid \$166,423 to watch ex-heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson punch his way to a unanimous decision over Canada's George Chuvalo.

The attendance for tonight's twin bill might fall a little short of the Patterson-Chuvalo throng, but the live gate is virtually certain to exceed the Garden record of \$216,497, set in 1947 when Joe Louis successfully defended the heavyweight crown against Jersey Joe Walcott.

"The crowd will be over 18,000 and the gate could go as high as \$250,000," predicted Harry Markson, the Garden's boxing director.

Some 400 ringside seats and \$20 tickets in the end area remained unsold Monday. They were expected to be gobbled up today by ticket fans anxious to sit in boxing history.

Both bouts will be shown over closed circuit television to 86 theaters, arenas and auditoriums with a total of 530,000 seats in the U.S. and Canada. However, there will be no home television or domestic radio broadcasts of either bout.

## Koufax Pitches Today

SARASOTA, Fla. (UPI)—Southpaw Sandy Koufax, charged with three of the Los Angeles Dodgers' five exhibition losses, tries to hurl his way back into the win column today against the Chicago White Sox.

Monday, the Dodgers chalked up their 11th Grapefruit League victory by downing the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3.

Don Drysdale pitched seven strong innings, during which he struck out three batters. The right-handed ace tired in the eighth, yielding three runs on a hit batsman, a double by Jerry Adair and singles by pitcher Ken Rowe and Russ Snyder.

Johnny Podres took over on the mound in the final inning and retired Baltimore in order.

The Dodgers' fielding was sharper Monday than it had been in their previous couple of contests. The team's poor defense, a prominent factor in the humiliating slide from 1963 world champions to sixth place last year, is the Dodgers' Achilles heel this year. Their 21 errors thus far in exhibition play have let in 26 unearned runs.

The Dodger bombed Baltimore starter Wally Bunker Ford in the first two innings, making it the second time this spring he has lost to Los Angeles.

The Dodgers tallied three times in the first inning on singles by Maury Wills and Tommy Davis, and doubles by Willie Davis and Jim Lefebvre.

They picked up two more runs in the second on doubles by Wills and Drysdale and a single by West Parker.

Tommy Davis, who led the Dodger attack with two singles and a double, now holds the club's batting lead with a .431 average.

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—The Baltimore Bullets, ready to cast sentiment and Bob Pettit to the wind, hope to clinch their series tonight against the St. Louis Hawks in the Western Division semifinals of the National Basketball Association playoffs.

The underdog Bullets won two of the first three games against St. Louis and need just one more victory to clinch the best-of-five series and advance to the division finals against Los Angeles.

A St. Louis loss would bring to a sudden and the fabulous career of Pettit, the leading scorer in NBA history. Pettit, out of action for a month in the latter part of the campaign with injuries, already has announced he will retire at the close of the current season.

Baltimore, which finished third in the west behind St. Louis, registered a resounding 131-99 victory over the Hawks here last Saturday night.

The margin of 32 points was greater than the total margin the Bullets compiled in six previous successes over St. Louis this season.

## Dodger Eyes Upon Davis; He's Blazing New Trails

When does .431 equal .683?

Ask that question in the Los Angeles Dodgers' Vero Beach, Fla., training camp and the lowest rookie will come up with the right answer.

It's when Tommy Davis is hitting .431 because there's no better explanation for why the Dodgers are playing .683 ball with 11 victories in 16 exhibition games. Just as there is no better explanation for the Dodgers' disappointing .494 win-loss percentage in 1964 than Davis' .275 average.

"The Dodgers know their pitching should be among the best in the National League this year but are concerned over their run-scoring ability especially in view of the winter trade that sent slugger Frank Howard to the Washington Senators. That's why it's so important to them that T. Davis seems to have recaptured the form that made him the NL batting champion in 1962 and 1963."

Had Bad News' 153 runs batted in and 27 homers in 1962 and batted .326 with 88 RBI's and 18 homers in 1963. Tom came the ordeal of last season in which Tommy seemed to be swinging blindfolded at times.

Davis, hitting safely in his 15th game, had two singles and a double Monday when the Dodgers beat the Baltimore Orioles 7-3. In addition to his .431 average, Davis is slugging at an .884 clip and has hit no fewer than four homers. Don Drysdale pitched seven strong innings before weakening as the Dodgers snapped 13 e Orioles' five-game winning streak.

Ron Taylor and a Brysdale Schultz, the "long" and "short" relievers of the bullpen, pitched impressively as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Minnesota Twins 5-2. Taylor yielded his first run in 10 innings this spring when Tony Oliva hammered Taylor in the first inning while Schultz pitched three perfect innings after taking over in the fifth. 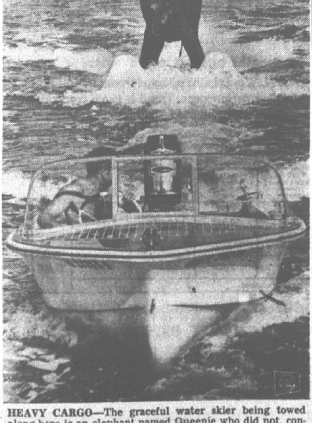

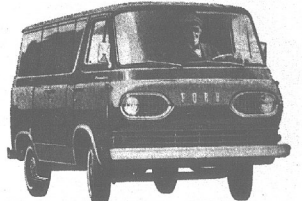
