The news today?
It's on the hopeful side.

In Moscow, Russian scientists claim to have discovered how to GET EDUCATED while asleep. They report that one woman student mastered a course of spoken English in 28 nights. They say that when she was tested at Kiev University it was found that her knowledge was equivalent to that achieved by existing methods in the normal FIRST YEAR course at the University.

How do they do it?
They describe it this way: After the pupils fall asleep words and phrases are read to them in a voice that is distorted to emphasize those characteristics of speech which are best perceived during sleep. At present they learn about 30 words a night. They think it is possible to memorize up to 400 words and phrases in this manner. They say that sleep learning tires the brain less than normal learning.

They've unveiled a computer that teaches mathematics to first graders. Dr. Stafford Suppes, of the Stanford faculty, says he feels fairly certain that the teaching of math, reading, languages and science by computer may become widespread in elementary schools within ten years.

From New Orleans, where the American Cancer Society has been meeting, comes this dispatch:

Committee OK's Aid Bill

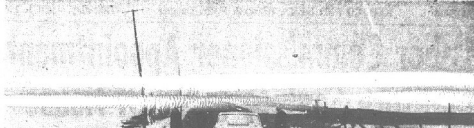
