

# Bank Debits Show Rise In Klamath

From \$52,652.219 to \$57,611.012 compared with the same two-month period for 1964 in the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce has reported.

The most recent figure reflected general increases in revenues collected locally in postal receipts, valuation of new buildings under construction, and the number of water users within the city.

Figures in the latter department showed that there were 9,523 water users during January and February compared to 9,403 for a similar period in 1964. Other comparisons established that postal receipts were up from \$77,495 to \$79,756 and indicated that the valuation of building construction increased from \$40,410 to \$102,000.

Meanwhile, receipts received from parking meters dropped from \$8,765 to \$8,480 for the same periods under comparison.

The nearly \$4,000 increase in bank debits for the two-month period ending Feb. 29 reflected nearly identical increases for each of those two months. January was up from \$55,905.651 to \$57,745.492 and February hiked from \$28,776.368 to \$29,864.610.
