Portland Bothered By Jinx

Portland's Western Hockey League playoff jinx was back to haunt the Buckaroos again today.

Lovly Vancouver, which had an 0-3 record against first-place Portland during the season, knocked off Portland on the Bucks' ice 6-3 Wednesday night in the opener of the first round of playoffs.

Seattle dumped Victoria, 4-2, in the other first round action.

Portland ought to be used to playoff miseries by now. Underdog San Francisco has knocked the Bucks out of the post-season playoffs for the past two seasons. But this year Portland seemed to be in better shape on the basis of its easy first-place finish in regular season play and its special domination over the third-place Canucks.

It was the first loss on home ice this season for Portland goalie Dave Kelly. Portland outshot the Canucks, 36-22, but the winners' Gilles Villeneuve was a tough man in the net.

Six different men scored for Vancouver, while Art Jones hit two for Portland.

At Seattle, scoring champ Guyle Fielder chipped in with three assists. Victoria thought it had a chance when Milan Mirosevic registered after 15:32 to make it 3-2.

But with 1:17 left to go, Victoria goalie Al Miller skated off the ice in favor of a forward so that the Maple Leafs could try to tie the score with an silk-out attack. The only trouble was that Seattle center Gerry Leonard stole the puck and scored into the open net. Miller was still skating away.

Playoff action in the best-of-seven series resumes Friday night.

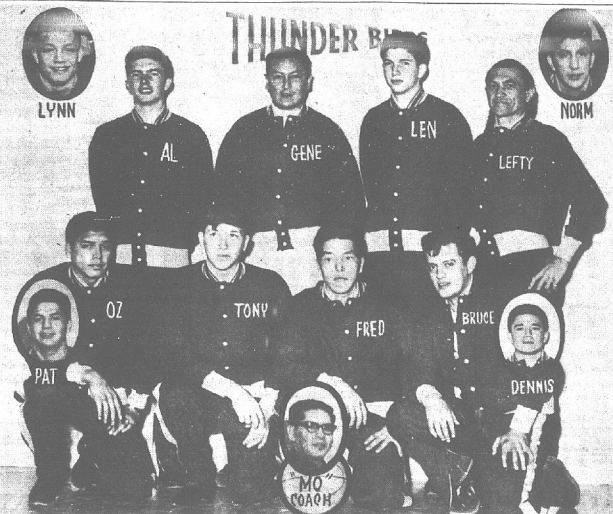

Umpires Meet At City Hall

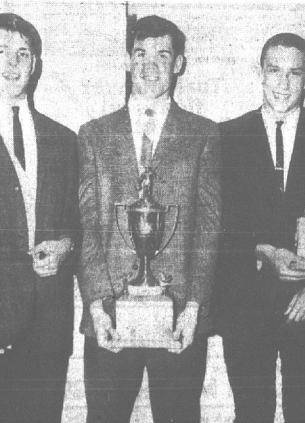
A baseball umpires meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Thursday at Klamath Falls City Hall.

The first rounders went into action at 1:30 this afternoon. Action continues tonight as the Warm Springs Magpies challenge host Chiloquin Thunderbirds in 7:30 action, and in the nightcap, Lapwai Idaho's entry tangles with the Warm Springs Cougars. The nightcap edition starts at 9 o'clock.

Second round action continues on Friday, with winners of the afternoon games tending in evening action, along with winners of the Thursday evening round. Losers in first round action move into consolation brackets where they hope to stay alive in a bid for the consolation title.

Action continues through Saturday evening, with the championship tilt scheduled for 9 p.m.

The Sprague River Indians are co-hosts of the big tournament, with Chuck Ruff as coach-manager of the team. Chiloquin's popular Thunderbirds are coached by Modesto Jimenez.

The Nez Perce Nation, Lapwai, Idaho, team, is the defending champion in the tournament, having retained the tournament's traveling trophy with little honors in 1964. They are coached by Jess Greene, and carry a talent loaded roster for action in case of necessity.

Both the Thunderbirds and Sprague River teams boast plenty of talent, most of whom are well known in this area, having played for area high school cage teams.
