past summer reduced the normal cash balance carryover. The quality of our maintenance work has been generally very good, thus repeat performances are not required, and we can move forward to other repairs."

Work 'Overdue'

"Much of this work," he commented, "is long overdue, and as it progresses, it will generate new private construction, and have a tremendous effect in upgrading the community."

Kyle suggested that work on the city's park system continue in accordance with a five-year plan adopted several years ago. He noted major items in the park schedule include landscaping of the Moore Park Marina and Conger Park. Further improvements at Moore Park, Kirk Carson and neighborhood parks and playgrounds are contemplated.

The city manager told the budget committee that his proposal is just that, and is subject to revision by the committee.

Review Sought

He suggested that the committee review each city department's goals as its budget is considered, and to help in this consideration, he invited consideration to tour the city with Mayor Zensky with respect to city property and improvements.

The committee agreed to this proposal. Plans call for this tour to occur prior to the budget consideration of the proposed budget, which will be in about three weeks by the city council. Mayor Zensky was re-elected chairman of the budget committee, which is composed of city council members and Robert Veatch and six members from the public.

Plans call for the committee's work on the budget to be completed by May 5. The city council then will hold a public hearing on the budget, and adopt it in June.

LAKEVIEW—With hopes of having a moulding plant in operation in about 60 days, M. R. Dame of Kanab, Utah, this week broke ground for construction of the buildings just west of Lakeview.

The location is on the site of the former Williams Brothers seed plant and pellet mill instead of the former moulding plant building of the American Forest Products Corporation which was previously considered.

A steel building 110 feet wide by 300 feet long is to be constructed and it is planned to complete the first half in time to start operation of the major portion of the moulding plant in two months. The rest of the building will be for storage and a work area.

During the building process, Dame will ship moulding lumber to his plant in Kanab, Utah, but later will close down this operation. The building is to be dismantled there and later this year moved to Klamath Falls. James Price and Vaughn Judd, who helped build the Utah plant, have arrived in Lakeview for the work here.

Jobless Rate Pleases LBJ

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson believes that the decline in the nation's unemployment rate to the lowest point in 7 1/2 years is the best economic news of 1965.

But Johnson wants business and labor to continue cooperating to keep the economic boom rolling and reduce joblessness even more.

Johnson made the comment Thursday after the Labor Department announced that unemployment fell by 478,000 in March to 3.74 million.

Even more important, the seasonally adjusted jobless rate dropped to 4.7 per cent of the labor force — its lowest rate since October, 1957.

This means that 47 of every 1,000 persons in the labor force were looking for a job last month but did not find one.
