

Celts Beat Philadelphia; Lakers Lose Elgin Baylor

The Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers are one-fourth of the way to a championship showdown in the National Basketball Association, but injuries still might bar a meeting between the regular-season division leaders.

The Celtics overcame a long list of assorted ailments to defeat the Philadelphia 76ers 108-98 on Sunday, and the Lakers beat the Baltimore Bullets 122-115 on Saturday despite losing scoring Elgin Baylor in the opening minutes of the game.

Tom Heinsohn, John Havlicek and Bill Russell, the Celtics' walking wounded recently, showed their recuperative power by leading the Celtics.

Heinsohn, plagued by a foot injury during the regular season, scored 23 points, and Havlicek, sporting a swollen right hand and injured knee, doubled in 20 to lead Boston's offense.

Russell, who injured his ankle after the end of the regular season, grabbed 32 rebounds, one better than Philadelphia's huge Walt Chamberlain. Chamberlain led both teams in scoring with 33 points.

The Celtics and 76ers resume their best-of-seven series in the Eastern Division finals on Tuesday at Philadelphia.

The Lakers will have to complete the playoffs without the injured Elgin Baylor, who hurt his knee during the regular season.

Portland's Dave Williams took the 100-yard high hurdles in 14.6.

Columbia River High of Vancouver won the distance medley by a record time of 10:49.4 as Roscoe Divine had an anchor mile of 4:28.

Camilli Praises Brush-Back Pitch

SAN BRUNO, Calif. (UPI)—Dolph Camilli, who used to answer brush-back pitches by smashing home runs out of Brooklyn's Ebbets Field, blasted legislation Monday that penalizes hurlers for knocking batters down.

"I think the game is being killed by having the brush-back pitch outlawed," said the vibrant big guy who was Brooklyn's first baseman for six years. "I'm opposed to finding a pitcher \$50 if an umpire thinks that he has thrown a batter on purpose. It's a pitcher's stock in trade to let 'em know he's out there."

Now a scout for the New York Yankees, Camilli recalled the time that right-hander Bill Freed warned him, "be loose, Dolph," after being dealt to another club.

"And it was his prerogative to keep me loose," Camilli said.

Sun-kissed Camilli will be 57 this month but looks more like an athlete in his late 30s. At Leo Durocher, who managed him at Brooklyn, shouted during the banquet circuit this winter.

"There's my first baseman over there—Dolph Camilli. And he could start playing right now."

High Minimum
In eight National League seasons, Camilli never hit less than 23 homers. He drove across more than 100 runs five times, with his best seasons coming at Pittsburgh from 1938 through 1943 after he was traded by Philadelphia.

Camilli's biggest year was 1941 when he won the Most Valuable Player award with the National League champions after hitting 34 homers, driving in 120 tallies and batting .285.

Knock-down pitches hummed past him and other Dodger batters during the Durocher era.

"But we just got up and went for it," Camilli said. "There was a time when Paul Erickson of the Cubs made Billy Herman hit the dirt. Billy knocked the next pitch for a home run. Another time, five of our guys were hit in one game."

Ducks Claim Second Spot

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Defending NCAA champion Oregon scored 68 1/2 points to finish second in a triangular track meet Saturday.

San Jose State won with 74 points. California was third with 58 1/2.

In dual meet scoring, San Jose State defeated Oregon 74-71.75 and California 98-46 and the Ducks topped the Golden Bears 79-12-4-1.

Oregon's Ken Moore won two events—the mile in 4:08.8 and the two-mile run in 9:58.0. The Ducks captured six other first places.

Robinson, whose five homers rank him second only to Tony Conigliaro of the Boston Red Sox among the spring swatters, had had to share the club spotlight with southpaw Jim O'Toole whose victory Sunday was his fourth against no defeats.

Tommy Davis, who is tied with Robinson at five homers apiece, continued his clutch hitting by driving in two runs in the Los Angeles Dodgers' 4-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox. Davis, a two-time National League batting champion, now has a total of 26 RBIs in 21 games.

Dick Groat singled and tripled in a 10-run fourth-inning assault by the Cards, who romped to a 14-1 triumph over the Kansas City Athletics. Groat had three hits, as did Lou Brock, and Mike Shannon doubled a three-run homer for St. Louis, which capitalized on three errors by A's shortstop Bert Campaneris.

Pitchers Hobbled
Veteran right-handers Dick Donovan of the Cleveland Indians and Jack Sanford of the San Francisco Giants both worked impressive stints against the Los Angeles Angels, who were divided into two squads.

Donovan surrendered only two hits and no runs in 7 1/3 innings as the Tigers lashed the Angels 7-1, but reliever Ted Abernathy got credit for the victory when Cleveland erupted for six runs in the eighth inning.

Sanford shut out Los Angeles for seven innings in a 6-0 Giant victory. Dean Chance, the Angels' Cy Young award winner last year, was hit by a line

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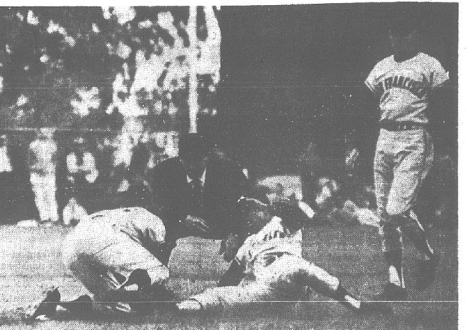

CRYSTAL MOUNTAIN (UPI)—Nancy Greene, Canada, reigns as 1963 National Alpine women's champion after recording three first-place finishes during three days of racing here.

Sonny Hit For Parking

DENVER (UPI)—Sonny Liston, ex-heavyweight champion, had another run-in with Denver law officers over his car.
