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No Match in Sight for Jack Dempsey

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—(United Press)—After several convincing examples given the boxing public in the last two years, it seems that a new heavyweight champion will arrive, not when a challenger has been built up, but when Jack Dempsey falls down to the level of an ordinary rival.

Dempsey is in the same position that Jim Jeffries found himself several years ago, when he was forced to go back to the farm because there was no heavyweight left for him to fight.

The present champion, however, is playing in harder luck than the former titleholder, because in Jeffries' time the championship was not a million-dollar asset and there was no system of building up a challenger to fool the public as there is today.

The unusual scarcity of heavyweights good enough to be steamed up into challenger material is evidenced most strikingly in the admission of Tex Rickard that he has failed to find a heavyweight good enough to risk the money that is necessary to put over a show in which the champion takes a part.

Rickard was very gloomy about future business prospects after Harry Wills and Luis Angel Firpo had made such a mess out of the fight in Jersey City that was staged for the purpose of finding an opponent for Dempsey in the next championship bout.

Wills had the finest chance of his life to make a showing that would force a promoter to arrange a match for him with the champion. He had everything to gain and nothing to lose. Wills did win the fight, of course, but he made such a bad showing that more than 40,000 paid customers, who support big boxing left the arena firm in the conviction that Wills couldn't go

more than a round with Dempsey of the Firpo fight. There is no question Wills did prove himself the standing challenger for championship. But at the time he showed himself to be very poor one. He is not to a bout with Dempsey he is the only one of the kind bunch that has never beaten by the champion. Good as he may be, never was an interestinger. He has never given a fight around New York and has soured the fans in the section where it is possible get the money that Dempsey demands for defending his title.

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
