IRISH LAD IS WINNER IN HIS FIRST MARATHON

OAKLAND, Sept. 24.—(United News)—It was Martin Hughes, who does a steady, mean job every day with a pick and shovel, since his arrival here from Ireland, County Mayo, two months ago, who ran away from a field of 375 trained runners and took home first place in the Merritt marathon here.

Hughes was a typical unknown but he wanted a watch and he saw by the papers that the winner of the Merritt marathon would get a nice bright gold one.

A couple of days before the race Martin knocked off work early and did a few miles around home to warm up and see how the legs were working. He blushing admitted as he finished the race far in advance of any of the others, that he had never done any running, except in emergencies, before.

After the first two miles of the race, the runners who in previous years have led the field, were so far behind Hughes that they settled down to a contest for second place.

Hughes, the first prize safely tucked away in the pocket of his overalls, was back at work the next day digging nice straight ditches with his pick and shovel.

BEEF LANDS OF VENTURA TO BE MADE PRODUCE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Sept. 24.—(United News)—A great farming land transaction involving a consideration of approximately \$1,250,000 and the purchase of 6,000 acres to be devoted to beef production near Oxnard, has been negotiated by the American Beet Sugar company, according to an announcement from the local offices.

The reason for the purchase of the property, it was stated, is due to the fact that the production of beets in southern California has been on the decline for several years.

The entire production of the 6,000 acre ranch will be shipped to Oxnard where it will be refined into beet sugar in the American Beet Sugar company refinery. More than 33,000 acres of land in California, Colorado and Nebraska are owned by the concern.

MOTION PHOTOS WILL AID FOOTBALL PLAYERS

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 24.—(United News)—Motion pictures may be introduced as a part of the training given football players at the University of California here, according to Raymond W. Cortelyou, athletic manager.

A new system of visual training, to be used in place of the customary chalk talks given players is being perfected by Richard H. Laney, a senior student from Los Angeles. Laney's plan is to take motion pictures of the team in action, showing the location and movements of each play for any man desired.

Experimental tests were recently approved by Cortelyou, Coaches Andy Smith and Nibs Price and Captain Babe Horrell.
