

### SUGGEST SOME CHANGE FOR GAME AND FISH

Removal of R. W. Price Urged Upon Governor Pierce and Reasons Given for Request

EUGENE, Sept. 29.—A bill to heal the defect in the present law whereby the state game commission is deprived of the right to open and close seasons was recommended at the final meeting of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association. Anticipating, however that there is a possibility of not being able to gain this right for the commission, the sportsmen passed another resolution asking the following:

1. A uniform angler's license, resident and non-resident of \$3.
2. Creation of a game preserve in Lake county for antelope and sage hens.
3. Abolition of beaver trapping.
4. An animal hunting license, costing \$25 for Japanese who are not citizens and other aliens.
5. Requirement for women to buy hunting licenses.
6. Allowing disabled veterans of the world war and other wars to fish and hunt without license.
7. An open season on deer from September 10 to October 20, extending to all parts of the state.
8. An open season for trout from April 15 to November 20 in all sections and providing that trout over 10 inches long may be caught in tidewater during the closed season.

#### Lake Change Opposed

The Oregon legislature will be asked to intervene against the placing of Diamond lake, now in the Umpqua national forest and under forest supervision, in control of the federal government under Crater national park. This lake, it was brought out, was one of the greatest assets the commission has at present for taking rainbow trout.

A closed season on sage hens and prairie chickens for five years was recommended.

The attitude of Richard W. Price as a member of the state game commission was condemned and his removal by Governor Pierce urged. It was declared that Price had failed to act in the best interests of sportsmanship.

The resolution said he had used his efforts to place Diamond lake in the Crater lake national park under federal control, that he failed to attend meetings and showed a "destructive rather than helpful" attitude in meetings of the game board.

After passing 15 resolutions vitally affecting the fish and game laws of the state, the association adjourned to meet again in Portland next February as guests of the Multnomah Anglers and Fishermen's club.
