## Ban Johnson Does Another Wow-Wow

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Ban Johnson has been wow-wowing again out in Chicago. One good wow deserves another.

Here's wow.  
Ban Johnson deplores the fact that the athletes in baseball have no incentive but money.

Conceding that the money incentive is a sordid one, what does Ban Johnson propose to do about the spirit of the club-owners, which must be very sordid indeed? The Brooklyn Dodgers, for instance, paid \$17,857 as income tax on their receipts for the season of 1923 which was a poor season as compared with 1924 when their own Dazzy Vance became the greatest pitcher in the game, next to Babe Ruth, the greatest individual drawing card.

For many years, the Brooklyn magnates have been known as near, not to say extremely close, club-owners. They stuffed the uniforms of their club with senile or juvenile or misfit players and the Brooklyn team which somehow managed to put up such a great fight for the National league pennant of 1924 was largely made up of the famous Sam Brothers, Flot and Jet. The whole team costs less than the price on the invoice of Babe Ruth alone.

If the Dodgers had to pay \$17,857 as income tax in 1923, they surely will have to pay much more this year.

Is this sordid, Mr. Johnson? And there's the case of the Pittsburgh Pirates. In an hour of ebullition at a banquet in Pittsburgh a few nights ago, Barney Dreyfuss, the owner of the Pirates asserted that his club played to 1,278,000 cash customers in 1924, including 750,000 on the home lot where the home

club takes the larger share of each paid admission.

Does this constitute a sordid motive for Dreyfuss and if so what will be done to improve the spiritual tone of his interest in baseball?

Also, we understand that Johnson, himself gets \$30,000 a year or about six times the pay of the average ball-player whom he considers so sordid. Johnson certainly doesn't draw any customers to the gates. That fact was demonstrated when he absented himself from the recent world series, notwithstanding which the gate receipts topped all previous records.

Will Johnson look to his own motives and voluntarily amputate nine-tenths of his pay? Har-har-har!
