Announcement is now being made of the first prize award in the Ninth Biennial Prize Competition for American Composers. Stephen Randolph, of Cincinnati, has won the \$500 prize for a Symphonic Poem (Class I), called "The Pit and the Pendulum." This prize is offered by the Harmony club, of Fort Worth, in honor of Mrs. John F. Lyons, founder and president of 19 years, who is now national president of the federation. It will be given adequate presentation on the Biennial program at Portland.

YALE SINGERS WIN COLLEGIATE MEET

Yale university's prosperous year in athletics is matched by achievement in one of the arts as shown in its winning for the second time the Intercollegiate Glee Club contest in New York city. This gives Yale two of the three necessary legs on the prize cup offered by the Intercollegiate Musical Corporation which organizes these contests from its headquarters, 437 Fifth avenue,

New York city. New Haven's singers scored 249.6 points out of a possible 300 as compared with the 223 scored by Princeton, winner of second place. Next came Dartmouth with 218, followed by Missouri university, winner of the newly organized Missouri valley district contest. The judges were: Ralph L. Baldwin, Arthur Bodanzky and Krut Schindler.

John Coolidge, son of the president, sang in the ranks of the Amateur Glee club. Besides Missouri, H. Hazelrigg, pianist. Possessing a tenor voice of rare quality and a personality that wins his audience, of Wisconsin, victor in the mid-west contest at Chicago, and Syracuse university, winner of the New

York state contest. Fourteen glee clubs in all took part. Albert F. Pickernell, in charge of the contest, announced that a new district contest would be added for next season—one for the New England colleges.

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
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
